NEWS OF THE WORLD.

The powers object to the terms of peace demanded by Turkey, claiming them to be excessive. They object to the cession of Thessaly to the Turks, and will not see Greece crushed.

Prince Luigi of Savoy, Duke of Abruzzi and nephew of King Humbert, left Liverpool with his suite, on his way to Alaska, where the prince will make an attempt to ascend Mount St. Elias.

The police of Moscow made sixty arrests, most of the suspects being men with university educations, although working as mill hands, on a charge of planning a big mill strike. They will be sent to Siberia without trial.

Baroness von Turkheim, alias Young, alias Mrs. D. M. Delmas, has left Liverpool for San Francisco. When she reaches her destination sensations are expected.

President McKinley has sent a message to congress recommending the appropriation of \$50,000 to be immediately available for distribution among destitute Americans on the island of Cuba.

The supreme court of Helena, Mont., has sustained the anti-scalper law.

The Illinois Central railroad company has negotiated a sale of \$30,000,000 of 3 1/2 per cent gold bonds.

The Illinois state supreme court has handed down a decision declaring the indeterminate sentence law to be unconstitutional.

Gorton & McCabe, furniture dealers of Rochester, N. Y., confessed judgment for nearly \$80,000 on three promissory notes.

The bodies of twelve unidentified victims of the steamer Loena fire were interred in the Mount Olivet cemetery, New York.

The Western Passenger association is making a strong effort to do away with the running of home-seekers' excursions during the coming summer.

General Merritt has refused to appoint a court-martial to try charges against Lieutenants O'Brien and Bamford preferred by Captain Romeyn.

At the convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, Board of Erin, the topic was the proposed amalgamation of the two wings of the order.

The state central committees of the silver republicans, populists and silver democrats of Iowa decided to hold three conventions at Des Moines on June 23d to nominate a state ticket.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad the old directors were reelected. The net earnings of the road were \$3,280,111.

The Russian Ambassador at Paris has handed an autograph letter from the czar to President Faure expressing the czar's condolences with the families of the victims of the charity bazaar fire May 4th.

The Kentucky senate has passed a resolution requiring jailers and other officers holding persons threatened with mob violence to arm the prisoner that he may defend himself, and to protect the prisoner with the aid of a posse, with the right of fortifying his own house.

The Interstate Commerce commission will early in June hear the accusations made by the Warehousemen's association against sixty-five railroad companies, that those companies are maintaining free storage-houses for favored customers in violation of the interstate commerce laws.

Professor Macoun of the Geological department of the Canadian government has left Ottawa for the Pribylov islands to study seal life.

The rebellion in Honduras has been quelled.

A terrific storm struck Norfolk, Va., and wrecked business and dwelling houses. A number of people are reported to have been killed.

Tillie Smith and Mandy White, colored girls, were lynched at Jeff, Ala., for poisoning a man named Kelly.

Of late large numbers of girls have been leaving Ireland for the United States in hopes of securing employment. Last week one steamer brought 550 of them.

Commander Booth-Tucker of the Salvation army was indicted by the New York grand jury for maintaining a public nuisance in the army headquarters. The indictment charges that the Salvation army headquarters is an ill-governed disorderly house.

Forest fires are raging in the pine belt, a hundred miles from White Earth, Minn., and considerable damage is being done to timber.

According to the final report of the grand jury of Butte, Mont., the defalcation of C. Q. Johnson, ex-county clerk, amounts to nearly \$14,000. Johnson is missing.

Fire did \$40,000 worth of damage to the courthouse at Lexington, Ky.

Frank A. Vanderlip of Chicago has been nominated for assistant secretary of the treasury.

Ex-Congressman Stephen R. Malloy was elected United States senator from Florida, on the twenty-seventh ballot.

The test speed trial of the new gunboat Nashville on Long island sound proves her to be the fastest boat of her class in the world. Her average speed was 16.76 knots per hour.

Major-General James W. Forsyth, commanding the department of California, has been placed on the retired list on his own application.

Details received from Pickney, Tenn., show that ten men lost their lives by the falling of the tippie at the ore mines there.

South Australia was severely shaken up by earthquakes. Many buildings were damaged, and people are living in tents for safety.

A. P. Edgerton, ex-United States civil service commissioner, died at his home at Hicksville, Ind.

Colonel William R. Brown and W. P. Bruner, aged 70 and 82 years old, were indicted by a Marion, Ill., jury for the embezzlement of money deposited in their bank prior to its failure. The verdict fixed the penalty at one year's imprisonment and a fine of \$410 each.

A Washington authority states that Judge Morrow, now of the United States district bench in California, has been decided upon to succeed Attorney-General McKenna as judge of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. It is understood that Judge Waymire will succeed Judge Morrow.

Ex-Postmaster John Wannamaker at a banquet of the Business Men's League of Philadelphia said a new political party would soon be organized to take part in state and national elections.

By the wrecking of a cattle train near Enfauna, I. T., an unknown negro boy and fifty head of cattle were killed. Engineer Peter McCarty, Fireman C. F. Overd and two train hands were seriously injured.

The movement to secure the adoption of a universal postage stamp by the postal congress in session at Washington, D. C., has collapsed.

President W. P. Nichols of the Bank of Commerce, New Orleans, convicted of embezzlement, was sentenced to three years at hard labor in the state penitentiary.

The Butte, Mont., Reduction Works were almost destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$10,000.

James Anderson, wanted in Yuba county for larceny, has been arrested at Chico. Anderson had a spring wagon and cart, both loaded with all kinds of goods. The value of the stuff he carried was valued at \$250. Anderson is supposed to be the thief who for a year past has been operating in several counties of the Sacramento valley.

Judge Gibbons of Chicago rendered a decision declaring the American Tobacco company an illegal corporation and prohibiting its agents carrying on its business in the state of Illinois.

A boiler at Ward's sawmill, near Randolph, Ky., exploded, killing Geo. Brown, Simon Kirkpatrick, J. D. Ward and his son, Virgil Hundley was fatally hurt, another of Ward's sons had both legs broken and will die, and a third son was seriously hurt.

The London newspapers have commenced a crusade against the Standard Oil company of the United States, which has control of the oil trade of Great Britain and sells refuse oils for lighting purposes.

Macedona Frausta, a 17-year-old boy, of Menclova, Mexico, shot and killed four men in order to elope with his sweetheart.

N. B. Clark of Grand Rapids, Mich., a member of the Michigan Bark and Lumber company, was found dead in the outskirts of Milwaukee. It is supposed that he was murdered and robbed by thugs.

Marquis Ito, the distinguished Japanese statesman, will visit Washington this month on his way to England.

A tea inspector will be appointed by the Government to be located at Tacoma, Wash.

Elverton R. Chapman of New York, the recalcitrant sugar-trust investigation witness, surrendered himself to the New York authorities and has been placed in jail to serve his sentence.

Turkey has made known her terms of peace with Greece, which has been under consideration for some time. The Porte replied, officially, to the note of the powers and declines to an armistice until the following conditions: The annexation of Thessaly, an indemnity of 10,000,000 pounds, Turkish, and the abolition of the capitulations, or privileges accorded the Greeks on Turkish territory and secured to them by treaty. The Porte declares that if these conditions are declined the Turkish army will continue to advance.

There seemed to be an epidemic of murders Sunday, women being the victims in each case. Mrs. Louise McCarthy, while returning from church at Tacoma, Wash., was shot through the brain by her husband, John Arthur McCarthy, and died shortly after the shooting. After the deed was committed he shot himself in the head and died in an hour. They had lived apart for sometime and Mrs. McCarthy's refusal to see her husband led up to the deed. J. S. Cole, a teamster of Castroville, Cal., is under arrest for the murder of his sister-in-law, Miss Mary Perez. Cole had choked the woman to death in an effort to assault her. Harry Arnett, a confectioner living at Angels camp, Cal., shot his 15-year-old wife, because she resented his abuse. Finding that the bullet did not kill her he dragged her to the door step, seized a hatchet and killed her by chopping her head open. The crime was soon heard of and a mob of miners formed and started for Arnett intending to lynch him. When closely pressed he shot himself, inflicting a fatal wound.

The Brotherhood of Tailors, with a membership of over 30,000, have decided to strike in New York.

The beet sugar seed which the Agricultural Department has been distributing is practically exhausted, about 10,000 pounds having been sent out to farmers in about four-fifths of the States.

The tobacco manufacturers of Ohio and Kentucky have appointed a committee of three to present a protest to the United States senate against the increase of duty on manufactured tobacco.

George Francis Train reopened his claim to the city of Omaha, and he intends to press it to the last. If he wins he will be worth \$20,000,000.

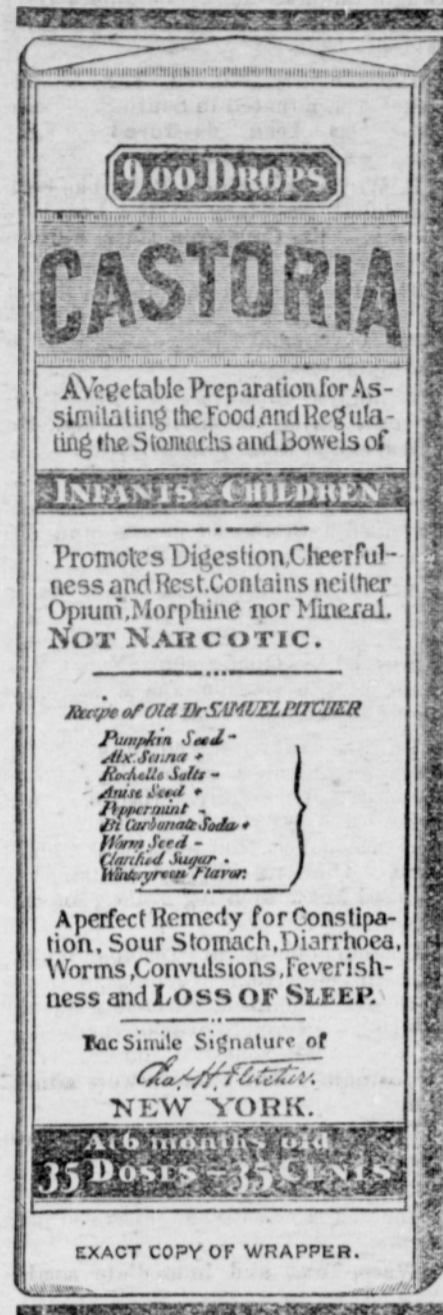
