PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

Halibut fishing has commenced at Trinidad, with poor success.

An endowment fund of the Knights of Pythias has been organized at Fortuna, Cal.

The grave of Millionaire W. S. Ladd in Riverside cemetery at Portland, Or., was robbed. The object of the ghoul is evidently to hold the body for ransom.

The Sans Poil wagon road has been finished to within twenty-three miles of Colville reservation. Twenty-eight miles have been built. The road is being built at the rate of a mile a day.

Henry Boldman, a Contra Costa farm laborer, shot his wife with a small revolver, and then attempted suicide. Both will recover.

Mrs. James Berry, an aged colored woman, was shot and instantly killed by her jealous, wife-beating husband.

Jerry Jones has been selected chief of the Humboldt Indian tribe and will go to Washington to see President McKinley and get him to intercede for government aid.

J. A. Albrecht of Corvallis, Or., has a fig tree in his yard that is five years old, and at the butt the tree is four or five inches in diameter. Mr. Albrecht estimates that there are fully 1000 figs on the tree this year.

Strawberry growers of Hood river, Or., say that an immense crop is coming on and that persons seeking work can find employment for the next month picking berries in Hood River valley.

A million and a half feet of logs have been landed in the dam above Colfax, Wash., and the mills will soon start cutting them.

David Davison shot and killed his wife, Mrs. Davidson, proprietress of a restaurant at Randsburg, Cal. The couple had been divorced. No motive is known for committing the deed.

In searching the county jail at Seattle a few days ago the officers found several razors and knives secreted in the cells.

Governor Budd has appointed Marsden Manson, John R. Price of Colusa and W. L. Ashe of San Francisco members of the state highway commission.

The Labor Exchange of Bakersfield is making an effort to raise \$5,000 with which to build a cannery this summer.

William Sullivan, who pleaded guilty to having attempted a criminal assault on the fourteen-year-old daughter of Rev. M. J. J. of San Miguel, was sentenced to seven years in Folsom.

Ed Sherman, a miner, was killed by a blast in the Donnebroke mine, near Marysville, Cal.

Nightwatchman Champ Payne of the Gilmore & Bauer placer mine, Kerby, Or., shot two men who were stealing gold from sluice boxes. One robber was killed and the other fatally wounded.

The railroad and steamship companies operating between San Francisco and Portland, Or., are engaged in a rate war.

John Koeh and James Grubbins were arrested at Stockton and fined \$5 each because they refused to give their names to the tax collector and would not pay their poll tax.

Governor Budd appointed George H. Smith of Los Angeles commissioner for the promotion of the uniformity of legislation in the United States. Twenty-nine states have appointed similar commissioners, and the intention is to hold a national convention for considering chiefly uniform laws relative to divorce and insolvency.

Frank Valdez, the Mexican youth who confessed to the murder of Mike Lorden, the Calabasas storekeeper, was brought before Judge Smith at Los Angeles, and pleaded not guilty. His trial was set for June 28th.

The first of the trials arising out of the tramway disaster at Point Ellice, Victoria, B. C., last May, has resulted in a victory for the plaintiff, Mrs. Gordon, whose husband was killed. She was awarded \$10,000 damages.

W. W. Fogg, a well-known farmer at New Hope, was found dead in a livery stable at Lodi, Cal. Death was caused by an overdose of laudanum.

Mrs. Reed was burned to death near Upper Ahlthaus, Wash., by her clothes taking fire while passing brush fire.

J. W. Walker of Portland, Or., was arrested in San Francisco on an indictment brought by the federal grand jury of Oregon. Walker is charged with having attempted to bribe some jurors in the circuit court of Oregon.

Edward M. Croisan has been elected superintendent of the Oregon state reform school to succeed R. J. Hendricks.

The directors of the Linda Vista Irrigation district have received bids for the purchase of \$820,000 bonds of the district. William Osborn was the sole bidder. He offered par for the bonds.

Representatives of a San Francisco house have just bought \$30,000 worth of wool in the neighborhood of North Yakima, Wash.

Through his kindness to a servant fifteen years ago, William F. Hastings, a workman at Millbrae, Cal., has come into an estate of over \$70,000. Hastings took care of a sick servant girl at that time. She eventually married a wealthy man and died a widow recently leaving her fortune to Hastings.

A. L. Kennedy and his wife, who conduct what is known as the Gospel army at San Francisco are in jail, for cruelly beating a year-old baby that left with them to take care of.

W. A. Sanders, the Reedy forge, has been taken to San Quentin, to commence serving his term of fourteen years.

Arrangements have been made at Santa Cruz for a week's encampment of the Fifth regiment, N. G. C., beginning July 17th.

New placer diggings have been discovered eight miles from Dale city, Cal. A nugget worth \$11 has been found and two other parties took out two and a half ounces of gold in two days. Two others who have been working thirty days, have taken out \$1200 to \$1500.

Benton Killon of Portland, Or., has been appointed a special commissioner by Secretary Wilson of the Agricultural department to visit Alaska and report to congress the advisability of establishing an experimental station in that territory.

Alex. McKenzie, 15 years of age, while lassoing wild horses near Carson city, Nev., became entangled in the lariat and was dragged considerable distance, receiving injuries that may prove fatal.

The levees along the Calaveras river, at Lockeford, in San Joaquin county, gave way under the high water, and within half an hour thousands of acres were flooded and damaging crops to the extent of \$15,000.

The schooner Nereid was seized by custom officials at San Diego and her captain and a sailor arrested, charged with smuggling opium and aiding in the unlawful entry of Chinese into the United States.

Carl Anderson, formerly of Oregon, was killed at Aspen, Col., by a cave-in in a mine.

A firebug has lately been at work, without serious results, at San Luis Obispo.

Frank Prather, charged with stealing cattle from the Fair ranch near Woodland, has been found guilty.

The Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias held its session at Hanford, Cal., last week. The election of officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: A. J. Buckles, supreme representative; W. H. Grant, grand chancellor; C. L. Patton, grand vice-chancellor; H. Schaffner, grand keeper of records and seal; G. S. Little, grand master of exchequer; L. B. Short, grand master-at-arms; T. H. Blackman, grand inside guard; J. O. Johnson, grand outside guard. The next session of the grand lodge will be held at Santa Rosa.

The highwayman killed at Tacoma, Wash., last week, while holding up the passengers of a street car, has been identified as Jack Case, the Oregon desperado.

Gray's harbor, Wash., lumber shipments in April were: Hoquiam, 11 cargoes, 3,233,000 feet; Aberdeen 8 cargoes, 2,715,000 feet; Comopolis, 3 cargoes, 1,000,000 feet.

The State Board of Horticulture of Washington announces that the prune crop in Western Washington promises to be so heavy this season that the growers are at a loss to know how to dispose of them, particularly on Puget sound, where the business is new and few growers have drying apparatus.

The Transportation company's new wharf at Woodland, Cal., containing 1000 sacks of wheat belonging to the Fair estate, slid into twenty-four feet of water.

All the insurance men of San Luis Obispo have formed a combine and agreed not to cut rates.
