## NEWS OF THE WORLD.

A warrant is out for Clifford R. England, bookkeeper of the Warren-Scharf Asphalt Paving company of Detroit. He has disappeared and, it is alleged, taken \$10,000 of the firm's money.

James K. Andrews, former cashier for C. P. Kimball & Co., carriage manufacturers of Chicago, is under indictment for alleged forgery in securing \$24,000 from the Union Trust company.

Train wreckers have been at work again on the Central road of New Jersey, and wrecked two fast trains, blocking the tracks and causing the loss of at least \$50,000.

The injunction which stood in the way of the new glucose combination by restraining the sale to it of the American Glucose company of Peoria, Ill., was dissolved and the transfer took place immediately.

The Argentina wool crop is reported as being superior in quantity and quality to that of 1896. Sowing wheat and flax are 50 per cent better than a year ago, and the grain is described as in splendid condition.

There is a serious split in the Populist State convention at Columbus, O. The anti-fusionist taking advantage of their majority, organized the convention a day ahead of time and proceeded to run things to suit themselves.

Owing to the increasing demand for coal, the Sweetwater Mining company's mine No. 2, at Rock Springs, Wyo., which has been idle for some time, has resumed work. The company is advertising for 100 men to work in the mine.

While attempting to escape from the state prison at Charlestown, Mass., Herbert Willis, a life prisoner, was fatally injured and his brother Edward, who assisted him in his break for liberty, was seriously wounded by the guards.

The government will order the release of the schooner Blanche Morgan, now detained at Bridgeport, Conn., as a suspected filibuster. The ammunition found on the Morgan belonged to the government and was being shipped to New York.

William A. McLean, a collector for the Grand Trunk railway, has begun suit at Detroit against Joseph M. Kresler, former president of the Michigan League of American Wheelmen, for \$50,000 for alleged alienation of Mrs. McLean's affections.

The packers of Kansas city have advanced the price of dressed beef 1 cent per pound and that of bacon 1 1/2 cents per pound to their customers, and the dealers will buy their own meat in future. This rise is attributed to a new attempt at forming a beef trust.

Alderman William Mangler of Chicago was sentenced to pay a fine of \$1000 and serve ninety days in jail for contempt of court. A few weeks ago Mangler stated that an attempt had been made to bribe him, but he refused to tell the grand jury the man's name.

A plan for the control of the Union Pacific railroad by the Vanderbilts has been completed. They propose to purchase the road when it is sold in October, and by running it in connection with the Oregon Shore Line, have a direct route from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

The tide of immigration to the United States is at its lowest point since the general government assumed jurisdiction of the subject in 1882. The number of arrivals from all countries, according to Treasury statistics during the last fiscal year was 230,832, a decrease as compared with the previous year of 112,435.
