TEA STERLING FACTS.

Evidences of the Returning Tide of Prosperity.

General Passenger and Ticket Agent F. I. Whitney, of the Great Northern in St. Paul, has a novel way of infusing the spirit of confidence in his large army of agents. He sends out monthly letters, urging upon them the importance of talking good times to their friends and patrons. His last circular, just issued, and received in this city yesterday, is unique and interesting. The conditions for better times, he says, throughout the country have not been so good for several years. As to the proofs of the returning tide of prosperity, the commercial agencies, Bradstreet and Dun, have gathered evidence based upon the following facts:

First—The crops are good.

Second—The price of wheat, cotton and other staples has advanced which means millions of dollars for producers.

Third—The crops in foreign countries are short, which means continued exports and good prices.

Fourth—Merchants, feeling the stimulus of better times, are buying larger stocks than for several years past.

Fifth—Railways are having more traffic at this period than for a long time.

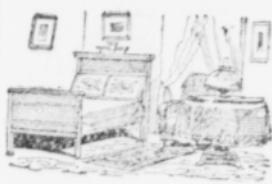
Sixth—Manufacturers are putting their mills and factories in order for a business the extent of which has not been known for years.

Seventh—Our exports are largely in excess of imports, which makes us a creditor nation, giving us the balance of trade, which for some time has been against us.

creased output of the yellow blood of commerce, has a strong tendency to make still better prices.

Ninth—The general hopefulness among farmers, which has not prevailed for several years.

Tenth—The easy condition of the money market and large loans seeking investment.

There are 26,000 acres planted in prunes in Oregon—15,000 of them in the Willamette valley, 6500 in the Umpqua valley and 1500 in the Rogue River valley. The coast counties and Eastern Oregon have 2000 acres.

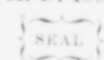

This paper mill is certainly a great thing for Lebanon, and pays out many thousands of dollars each year to the laboring men of that place.
