Business men south of here are put out because they are unable to tell when goods will reach them, and frequently losses on this account. Petitions are being sent in to the company asking for a restoration of the daily freight service, and if no action is taken it is quite likely that steps will be taken to retaliate upon the company when fruit and other products are shipped out.—Roseburg Review.

The "power" has been sending gold into the United States, through New York, San Francisco, New Orleans and other ports, until we now have a gold circulation of \$50,000,000 in excess of that of a year ago, with a total circulation nearly \$100,000,000 larger than a year ago.
