NOTHING SPECIAL ON DOCKET.

The City Council Met Monday Night.—Regular Routine Business Transacted.

Last Monday night the city dads met in regular session. All being present.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

W. C. Hubbard presented a bill for the G. H. M. Co., for blankets amounting to \$2.50, which was referred to the finance committee.

I. N. Smith was allowed \$20.88 for lumber. Wm. Rolls \$5.75, H. C. McNeill \$4, Wm. Flippen \$4.25 for street work. A. L. Harvey's bill of \$2.50 for nails was granted. Joe Beeman hall rent \$4 allowed. C. H. Dalrymple legal services \$10; W. C. Hubbard marshal \$10; W. A. Carter \$6.

\$17.88 was ordered charged up on the book of liens against the Hotel Property of O. Swacker for side-walk put in by the city.

The Stock and Dog Tax ordinances were after discussion referred to the ordinance committee.

Recorder Carter was instructed to have the marshal remove nuisance from the street in front of Beeman's building.

The Recorder was instructed to order property owners along the west side of the street from the

livery stable to the river to put in 6 foot walk, and the committee on streets was instructed to arrange for lumber for the cross walks. Council adjourned.

In the probate court the value of Pullman's estate took the usual drop. Instead of being worth \$30,000,000, he leaves an estate of \$7,000,000. This is what always happens when a rich man dies, and it shows what extravagance prevails in the estimates of the wealth of millionaires. Probably somebody who knows that the Pullman Palace Car Company has \$30,000,000 of stock, assumed that Pullman owned it all, and asserted that the great car builder was a thirty-times millionaire. Other people accepted the statement, and so it passed into current history, its falsity only being proved by the death of the holder of the property. Just such exaggerated reports as these are responsible for a good deal of the prevailing social discontent. On such distorted statistics have been built up elaborate statements concerning a few men owning half the wealth in the country. There were 3300 stockholders in the Pullman company, and only one of them—George M. Pullman—was ever heard of. Therefore it was believed that Pullman monopolized all this vast property.—Ex.
