FUTURE PROSPECTS OF GOLD HILL.

The Following is What a Correspondent Writes the Oregon Mining Journal.

The Gold Hill Quartz Mining Co. has resumed work on that famous property. G. W. Short, a competent mining man of wide experience is superintendent. He is driving the tunnel and expects to cut the vein within a few feet. The rock, which has been very hard, is now much softer and with every shot appears more highly mineralized. Upon reaching the vein a drift will be run each way, and as soon as its location has been determined on it is Mr. Short's intention to begin sinking a two compartment working shaft. Mining men are looking forward to this development with more than ordinary interest. The stories told of this property in the day of its production forty years ago rival the lurid flashes with which Joaquin Miller lit up the trail to Klondike. Men came hundreds of miles on horse-back just to see with their own eyes this wonderful mine. It was a red hat time. Such was the excitement that for awhile a rope had to be stretched around the work to keep the eager crowd from encroaching. Every device, which Satan always provid-

es for those sucked into the maelstrom of a booming camp, was running here with safety valve tied shut. The gambling table was weighted down with its piles of virgin gold. The siren (not so primeval) found ever a willing listener to her song. The double daily line of stages between here and Jacksonville could scarcely accommodate the restless crowd which surged back and forth between these two great gold camps. It was evidently "day, all day, in the daytime" and there was no night in Gold Hill then whether the work finally stopped because the vein pinched, or because the rock was too low grade for those days is not definitely known. It seems to have been as much the fashion then for all good mines to close down after a period of successful production as for children to have the whooping cough. At any rate it did not stop and the old workings caved in and no intelligent persistent effort has ever until recently been made to re-open it. It looks as if its second record was now about to begin. If it is like the first, Gold Hill won't take any back talk even from Grants Pass.

The old Braden property, another of our old-time producers with a record, was secured last May on lease and bond by Perham and Van Name. The mill, which from ill-treatment and disuse had become sadly dilapidated, was moved close to the mine, thoroughly overhauled and substantially set. The mine has been reopened in two places, is now a steady and profitable producer and furnishes the ten stamps all they can handle. If the present rate of profit is maintained the lessees will soon be on velvet. Mr. Swindon, the very skillful amalgamator in charge, is justly proud of the work he is doing.

The large Mears vein, which has excited so much interest among mining men, is soon to be opened by its fortunate owner, who has associated some Portland men with him in the enterprise.

Mr. Beaman is getting some very rich ore from his Reta mine.

A new strike just announced on Sardine creek is causing much excitement. I have obtained no particulars further than that the ledge is said to be very wide and highly mineralized.

Some work is being done on Gall's creek, where the Kubli, Last Chance, Daisy, Red Oak, Bliss and other mines are situated. These all produce high grade ore and only systematic development is needed to open up a permanent and very valuable industry on this creek.

Every train brings in mining men. The hotels and private boarding houses are doing a thriving business. Many new enterprises are being projected, of which I will write you hereafter. On the street,
