## NEWS OF THE WORLD.

### THREE MEN LYNCHED IN SOUTH DAKOTA.

**Miners to Fight a Smelter Trust—The Islands Will Be Annexed—A Banker Falls and Offers to Compromise With Depositors.**

Expert examination of the accounts of ex-State Treasurer Bartley of Nebraska proves the exact amount of his defalcation to be \$870,000.

Charles Page Bryan of Chicago has been appointed as minister to China, to succeed Charles Denby.

The value of the estate left by Charles A. Dana is estimated at over \$1,000,000.

Whitecaps at Oakdale, O., whipped two young women so badly that their recovery is doubtful.

Robert T. Lincoln has been elected to the vacancy caused by the death of George M. Pullman in the Pullman Palace Car company.

President J. C. Darragh found guilty of wrecking the Kansas City Safe Deposit and Savings bank of Independence, Mo., has been sentenced to two years in prison.

A gasoline explosion in the basement of the Alcott building at Fostoria, O. caused a disastrous fire. The loss will reach \$50,000.

It is said that a bill will be introduced in the New York legislature providing for the creation of a new state to be known as the state of Manhattan.

The Marion (Ind.) lodge of Elks has been suspended because of an alleged violation of the laws of the order in the manner of initiating Robert Fitzsimmons.

Mrs. Margaret Boughan, perhaps the oldest person in Massachusetts, is dead. She claimed to be 124 years of age.

Fire has destroyed the department store of W. A. Wieboldt & Co., known as The Lion, in Chicago. Loss, \$165,000.

An alliance of the companies engaged in the manufacture of insulated wire and cables for electrical purposes is being organized.

Former Judge Vincent, who conducted the defense in the first trial of Adolph L. Luetgert, has withdrawn from the case.

There has been a complete rupture of political negotiations between the National and Conservative parties of Colombia.

X rays played an important part in a damage suit in Brooklyn. A boy's alleged injuries were under examination.

In Silver Creek, N. Y., three men blew open the safe in Heines' bank, securing \$10,000 in money and \$4000 in jewelry.

Joseph E. Kelly has pleaded guilty to the murder of Cashier Stickney of the National bank at Summersville, Ill.

The Costa Rican legation denies that President Iglesias has exiled his predecessor, ex-President Mora. The latter is not living.

A receiver has been named for Seyfang, Prentiss & Co., bicycle manufacturers of Buffalo, N. Y. The assets double the liabilities.

Dr. Thomas W. Evans, the famous American dentist, who facilitated the flight of ex-Empress Eugenie from Paris in 1870, died suddenly, in Paris.

Military monuments were dedicated Orchard Knob, Pa., Monday.

Cecil Robinson, 14 years old, of Indianapolis, shot and killed his 17-year-sister, Mattie, while playing with a pistol that he thought was unloaded.

J. F. Herrman, for years a prominent attorney of Olathe, Kas., while in jail for obtaining money under false pretences, killed himself by taking carbolic acid.

Miss Francis E. Willard, president of the W. C. T. U., will contribute \$3000 to start the fund of \$300,000 necessary to hold control of the temple property in Chicago.

Frauds in payment for tobacco and liquor taxes in New York and supposed irregularities on the part of the government officials are under investigation.

The criminal courts of appeal of Texas has declared the cold-storage law passed by the last legislature unconstitutional. This is a victory for the liquor men.

The blast furnace operators of the Mahoning valley, O., have agreed upon an advance of 10 per cent in wages to their employees. At least 3000 men will be benefited.

Three thousand steers and 20 head of cattle were burned to death in Crosby county, Tex., by a prairie fire which is sweeping over range of the panhandle country.

As a result of a political quarrel at Hydon, Ky., John Sebree shot and killed Henry Davis, and Sebree was shot and mortally wounded by Mollie Davis, a sister of Henry.

A. G. Gillam, manager of the Jones-Nixon Publishing company of St. Louis and Democratic candidate for state senator at last election, has committed suicide.

Miss Ruth Colvin stepped on what is supposed to have been on signal torpedo on the sidewalk at Evanston, Ill. It exploded, almost severing her right foot from the ankle. The injury may result fatally.

James A. Allen, one of the most prominent business men of Painesville, O., committed suicide by shooting himself. Despondency caused by the death of his wife led him to kill himself.
