Mrs. Maud Booth of the American volunteers has been ordained a minister.

A fire is burning in the Smuggler mine, at Aspen, Col., that may last for months.

Boydell Brothers' paint factory in Detroit was gutted by fire recently. Loss \$100,000.

It is believed at Washington that the embargo on tobacco exports from Cuba will soon be raised.

President McKinley has signed the universal postal law treaty, which goes into effect January 1st, 1899.

An increase of 10 per cent in the wages has been announced in the Jersey woolen mill at Fall River, Mass.

Several persons accused of being implicated in the \$90,000 Creek warrant steal have been arrested at Muskogee, I. T.

The end of all interference with railroad traffic by yellow fever restrictions in Florida has practically been reached.

Prairie fires in Lubbock, Hale and Crosby counties, Tex., have burned over 600 square miles. Thousands of cattle and sheep perished.

Ex-United States Senator Peffer has sold his paper, the Topeka Advocate, to T. W. Harrison, ex-mayor of Topeka.

A reduction of wages ranging from 10 to 25 per cent been announced at the Winchell Shoe factory at Haverhill, Mass.

The Leather Belt Manufacturers' association met recently in New York and ordered an advance of 25 per cent in the price of belting.

Directors of the Rochester (N. Y.) Savings bank have voted to place that

place in liquidation. The deposits amount to less than \$200,000.

The New York law that all state concerns shall purchase all their supplies from the prisons, if such could be manufactured there, is said to be a success.

Immigration Inspector Baldwin of Mississippi has arrested 19 others of the party of Austrian stove-cutters, brought to the country under contract.

The supreme court of New Jersey has denied the application for a recount of the votes of the anti-gambling amendment to the state constitution.

A big gold strike has been made in the Enterprise gold mine at El Dorado, Col. Good judges of high grade ore say that the ore will not run less than \$10,000 per ton.

Robert Robyn, ex-cashier of the Manufacturers' National bank of Pittsburgh, recently indicted on a charge of making a false statement to the controller, has been arrested.

The executive committee of the United States Manufacturing Pottery association has decided to increase the selling price of American earthenware.

Charles Kuharich, secretary of the Croatian Colonization company of New York city, is now in Denver. He represents about 4000 families that are now ready for western immigration.

George M. Hughes of Anadarko, I. T., has arrived in Wichita on a trip to secure 20,000 colonists for the Wichita country, who will, by force of numbers, compel congress to open the country to settlement.

Congressman M. H. Jackson of North Dakota declares that the sealing agitation is a mere ruse to permit a small select party to prey on the treasury; that the destruction of the seal herds is to be ardently desired on the grounds of the highest public good.

Secretary Alger has issued an order for the retirement of Lieutenant-Colonel W. E. Waters, deputy surgeon-general, under the 30 years service act.

It has been determined to appeal to the public at large for subscriptions to a memorial for Henry George. Men of national renown have taken hold of the movement.

The National Grange session at Pittsburgh, Pa., last week elected as officers for 1898: Master, Maron Jones, Indiana; overseer, O. H. Hale, New York; lecturer, Alpha Messer, Vermont.

George Seagraves, proprietor of a restaurant at St. Louis, Mo., reproved his two grown sons for some trivial offense, which angered them, and they made a murderous assault on him. The father's skull is fractured and he cannot live.

The Midvale Steel works of Pennsylvania have been working night and day for two months upon a hurried order from the government. The big gun works are equally busy.

Consul Rounseville Wildman, at Hongkong, informs the state department that the largest items of import from the United States to that place are flour and petroleum. Regarding lumber he said there would be no trouble in selling the goods.

Representatives of all the principal transatlantic steamship lines met recently in New York and formed an immigration pool. As a result of this agreement emigrants bound to western points who may apply at the steamship offices on the other side will be given an order for a railroad ticket at regular prices.

German troops have been landed at Kiaochow bay, China, and took possession of three forts there. Chinese soldiers occupied the forts, but when they saw the Germans coming took to the woods. The German government is after satisfaction for the recent murder of two missionaries.
