A BIRD WITH TWO HEADS.

It Whistled With One and Ate With the Other.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 7.—A curious ornithological freak has been discovered in this city by Oliver P. Davies, a well-known ornithologist and the author of a book on the subject. Some time ago Mr. Davies' attention was attracted by the apparent possession of two heads by a little English sparrow. The bird seemed especially tame, and after several futile attempts to catch it a boy in Mr. Davies' employ finally managed to kill it. One of the heads was set on as usual in the bird line, while the other seems to have a windpipe running through the neck down to the lungs, but to have no other arrangement for eating or drinking. Mr. Davies has come to the conclusion that the bird whistled with one head and ate with the other. He has mounted it.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Harry Baird, the æsthetic individual who cut a wide swath as manager of the Tolo Mining Co., is being looked for by the authorities of Tacoma, Wash. He is charged with bigamy, but could also be indicted for other breaches of the law, if what is said about him is true.

The vote of the brotherhoods of locomotive firemen and railway trainmen on the question of federation of the two orders has been taken and is practically unanimous in favor of it.

Paul Vandervoot writes from Deming's bridge, Tex., that he has closed a deal for land for a Grand Army of the Republic colony, and at least 1000 colonists will move in after New Year's.

Hereafter revenue cutters will receive the names of tribes of Indians. The cutter launched at Cleveland the other day has been named the Agonquin and another will be called the Onondago.

It is announced that St. Louis will soon have a new hotel that will cost \$2,000,000. The hotel is to be the most modern structure of the kind west of the Mississippi and construction will begin next season.

A company has been incorporated at St. Louis with a capital of \$100,000 for the manufacture of enamel signs and the ornamentation of any metal with an enamel surface. This class of work is now being done only in Germany and England.

During a recent discussion in the Reichstag at Berlin a prominent statesman stated that Germany needed additional warships in order to be able to take an active part in the struggle for trade against America.

A fight occurred between three Mexican officers and members of Black Jacks gang of desperadoes, on the border between old Mexico and Arizona. The three officers and one of the desperadoes were killed.

The International and Great Northern railway, in the district court at Dallas, Tex., pleaded guilty in 20 cases of the violation of the Texas commission freight rates, and was fined a total of \$20,000 damages.

About a year ago the accounts of A. R. Spoffard, then congressional librarian at Washington, were found to be \$30,000 short, which amount Mr. Spoffard promptly made good. The shortage was attributed to clerical errors, and evidence to substantiate this belief is now being found. Tucked away in odd corners are being found numerous money orders, some of them dated 22 years ago. These had been entirely forgotten by Mr. Spoffard, and enough of them will probably be found to cover the missing \$30,000.

Commissioner of Immigration Fitchie of New York has been notified that a wholesale traffic in fraudulent naturalization papers is being carried on in Italy. The object of these fraudulent methods is to effect the entry into the United States under cloak of American citizenship of aliens who otherwise would be subject to exclusion.

William Wheeler was sentenced at Salinas, Cal., to ten years' imprisonment for burglary. He traveled through the state in a wagon and stole whenever he could get a chance.

Papers have been filed in the superior court of Sutter county, Cal., in which the constitutionality of levee district 6, a big district in the southern part of the county, is attacked.
