NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW
DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Russia Occupies Port Arthur, China.
British Forces Suffer Defeat in India.
A Briber Met With Machetes—Big
Fire at St. Louis.

The Citizens' bank of Oelwein, Ia., has failed.

Sir Frank Lockwood, England's famous barrister, wit and caricaturist, is dead.

New society leaders of New York propose to cut the "select" circle from 400 to 75.

The cruiser Raleigh has been ordered to China, to strengthen the American squadron there.

Sheriff M. S. Tarleton of Ritchie county, W. Va., is \$10,000 short in his accounts, and his bondsmen have given him up.

The general offices of the United States express company are to be removed from St. Louis to Cincinnati January 1st.

Mrs. Mary E. Lease is going to commence a canvas for the Populist nomination for congress in the seventh congressional district of Kansas.

The plate-glass strike is over in Kokomo, Ind., the 1600 men having accepted the companies' proposition for finishers to be paid by piece work.

The jury in the case the city of Omaha against the bondsmen of ex-City Treasurer Henry Bollen, returned a verdict in favor of the city for \$71,000.

If the Grand Army of the Republic Convention of 1900 is held in Pittsburgh, it is proposed to unveil a grand soldiers' monument to cost in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

Two small children of Albert Kaller of Muchakino, Ia., perished in a fire which consumed the family dwelling. The mother had left the children alone in the house.

Dispatches from India state that of late the British forces have suffered several severe defeats, and that the outlook for ending the rebellion prior to March is very poor.

Fire started in the building occupied by Mermod & Jaccard Jewelry company at St. Louis, and completely gutted the five-story building. The loss will reach \$335,000.

A locomotive exploded on Bear creek logging road, Repton, Ala., killing the engineer, John O'Connor; the fireman, Jack Clipper, and two other trainmen, John Johnson and Henry Vickery.

The Secretary of State has decided to omit the diplomatic breakfast usually given to the diplomatic corps on New Year's day in view of the death of the President's mother.

Banker J. H. Bacon, of Salt Lake has been sentenced to seven years' imprisonment for making false entries to the controller of currency while president of a national bank.

Mark Twain, the lecturer, who started some two years ago, to pay off the indebtedness he had contracted while with a publishing that failed, has just paid the last of the account.

John Strauss, of Elk City, Kas., is dead; his two sons are dying and Mr. Reed and his daughter are critically ill from drinking coffee into which rat poison had dropped accidentally.

John J. Hanrahan and Patrick Ferris, judges of elections in the Seventeenth ward at the last municipal election in New York, were convicted of falsifying the election returns, and will be sentenced to the penitentiary.

George Rollins, whose wife recently secured \$5000 from the Ancient Order of United Workmen and the Modern Woodmen, at Adair, Mich., on the supposition that Rollins had been drowned, was found in a hospital at Cleveland.

A treaty between the United States and the Seminole nation of Indian territory has been concluded. It provides for the allotment of lands for the Seminole nation and a division of moneys among the citizens after the tribal governments are extinguished.

A fire broke out at Grand Forks, N. D., and destroyed a wholesale grocery house and the Hotel Dakota, where nearly 130 guests were housed, and two blocks of property. The loss will reach nearly a million dollars. Six persons were burned to death in the hotel.

Colonel Ruiz, of the Spanish army, was recently sent to Cuban headquarters to try to bribe the insurgent chiefs to surrender, was captured by an insurgent guard tried, and condemned to instant death. The insurgents sent warning to the Spanish authorities that bearers of all similar messages would receive like treatment.

Flora Sweet, aged 40 years, living at Suquehanna, Pa., recently shot her mother, Mrs. Elvira Sweet, aged 60, in the breast with a revolver, inflicting a wound from which the latter died in about half an hour. The daughter admitted her guilt, and said it was the result of a quarrel.

Woodworking machinery manufacturers of the United States have organized and will incorporate under the laws of New Jersey as the American Woodworking Machine company. The sole object of the company is to decrease the excessive cost of manufacturing and selling. The capital stock is \$4,000,000.

A Russian squadron has entered Port Arthur, on the Chinese coast. They

claim the occupation is only temporary, but the general trend of events seem to prove otherwise. It is even hinted that there is a secret understanding that the powers have agreed upon a partition of the Chinese empire.

The sale of the Kansas Pacific railroad has been postponed until February 15.

Fire destroyed a business block in Jerome, A. T., last week, causing a loss of \$40,000.

Mr. Dawes, recently appointed controller of currency, will assume duties January 1.

The Overman Wheel company, manufacturers of bicycles, at Chicopee Falls, Ill., has failed.

Edward J. Buckley, the well-known California actor, died in New York from a stroke of paralysis.

Fire in the Atlas Safe company's five-story stone building in New York did damage to the extent of \$100,000.

The December grand jury of Kings county, N. Y., recently recommended that the office of coroner be abolished as useless.

The city of Chicago sold \$100,000 of refunding bonds, bearing 3½ per cent interest and to run twenty years, for \$103,660.

The Masonic Grand Lodge of New Jersey has purchased a magnificent property in near Burlington, for a state home.

Former Vice-President Levi P. Morton has accepted the presidency of the newly formed Fifth-Avenue Trust company, New York.

The reduced postage rate between Canada and Great Britain has been deferred so that the reduction will be made reciprocal.

Bonds are to be offered at subscription in New York city to the amount of \$1,200,000 for the Central Union Telephone company.

The Iowa Wholesale Grocers' association has adopted resolutions favoring the anti-scalping bill now before congress.

Mrs. Mary Pouch, of Norwich, Conn., 55 years of age, was accidentally shot and killed by her son James, aged 27, recently.

Preparations are being made to start the tube mills of the Oil Well Supply company, at Pittsburg. Fifteen hundred men will be employed.
