The McKinley dinner pails are going back and forth with daily regularity these times. They are full too. Wheat has gone up and potatoes are higher than last year, but what the workingmen want to know is: What is the use of cheap wheat and cheap potatoes if there are no wages coming in with which to pay for them?

The figures of the Bureau of Statistics of the Treasury Department for November show the exports to have been over \$82,000,000, an increase of more than \$5,000,000 over October, and over \$6,000,000 in excess of those of November of 1896. The increase over November, 1895, is \$22,000,000, and November, 1894 \$24,000,000. The exports for October of the present year fell short a few hundred thousand dollars of those of October of last year, under the Wilson law, and the Democrats thought they had an easy thing in proclaiming how the Dingley law was decreasing our exports, but November's figures have staggered them somewhat.

Of the various methods of investment by the Government of the postal savings to be accumulated through the postal banks which Postmaster-General Gary proposes to Congress to establish, that suggested by General Roy Stone, acting president of the Good Roads League of America, seems to be one of the most feasible and likely to bring the greatest benefit to the Government and the people. Gen. Stone favors the purchase by the Government with the postal savings of county bonds to run for a long period of years, the proceeds to be utilized in the building of roads in the rural districts. The bad roads of many sections of the country, and their almost impassable condition during part of the year, is a notorious fact, and if Gen. Stone's proposition can be carried into effect, it would seem to be one of the greatest advance steps taken by the Government for some time. Under his proposition there would be no tax whatever on the people for the construction of the new roads, as the money which now goes to annual repairs could be used for paying the interest on the bonds. Gen. Gary has the subject of postal savings banks well in hand, and is liable to be called on at any time by the Congressional committee having charge of the bill for his statement in support of his proposed measure.

It is reported that the Coos bay railroad will be extended to Roseburg this year. The S. P. Co. is said to be behind the scheme, in order that the bituminous coal beds of the Coquille country may be made available for fuel, as the wood supply along its main lines are getting short.
