THE CLARK MURDER.

Base Crime of a Brother Shown at a Cor-
oner's Inquest.

ST. HELENA, Cal., Jan. 22.—The
coroner's jury at the inquest in the
matter of the Clark murder had no
doubt as to the identity of the as-
sassin, and brought in a verdict
this afternoon that William Clark
had died at the hands of his broth-
er, George Clark. The evidence
adduced was highly sensational.
Mrs. Clark, wife of the murdered
man, who was on the stand for
three hours, admitted having sus-
tained criminal relations with her
husband's brother, stating that the
suspected murderer was the father
of one of her children, and adding
that he had recently asked her to
marry him several times, provided
William was out of the way. Fear-
ing exposure of her guilty secret,
Mrs. Clark testified that she assent-
ed to this and admitted that when
her brother-in-law went to Napa 10
days ago she knew his purpose was
to buy a pistol with which to kill
her husband.

George Day testified that on sev-
eral occasions William Clark had
ordered his brother out of the house,
merely saying in explanation
"George knows the reason."
