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NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Sheriff Martin and Deputies on Trial For Shooting Strikers—Thomas E. Watson Will be the Populists' Choice For Governor of Georgia.

New York is experiencing an extraordinary cold snap.

Rear Admiral David L. Braine, U. S. N., retired, is dead at Washington.

President Diaz of Mexico is preparing to make a visit to the United States.

The British have suffered another severe loss in India at the hands of the natives.

The steamer La Bretagne, has arrived at New York from France, with \$100,000 in gold in transit to Cuba.

Secretary Alger, who has been confined to his home by sickness, is reported much improved.

A fire occurred at East St. Louis last week and destroyed property to the extent of \$1,000,000.

Arizona miners held at meeting recently at Phoenix and planned to form a permanent organization.

Thomas A. Edison Jr. of New York is experimenting with an airship which he claims will be successful.

The National Federation of Musical clubs will hold its next general meeting in St. Louis in the spring of 1899.

According to a dispatch from La Paz, the nominal capital of Bolivia, that city has been declared in a state of siege.

Andrew C. Haughan, former city treasurer of Minneapolis, has been found guilty of misappropriation of the funds of the city.

An English syndicate has practically completed arrangements for the erection of a \$1,000,000 steel plant near Birmingham, Ala.

William and Harvey Tople are dead and Lew Wallace is fatally injured as the result of a pistol duel over a game of cards at Pineville, Ky.

Sixty-nine bids were tendered for the work of building the armor plate factory for the government. They are being considered.

The gold production of Mexico for last year was \$6,861,326, a gain of more than \$800,000 over 1896 and of more than \$2,000,000 over 1890.

Emmett Rogers, ex-treasurer of Ridgely lodge, No. 435, L. O. O. F., committed suicide by shooting. He was \$850 short in his accounts.

The coal operators of Illinois will shortly advance the price of their product 25 cents per ton, as the result of the advance of 10 cents a ton for mining.

The International Paper company of N. Y., a combination of all the big firms in the country, has filed articles of incorporation, with a capital stock of \$45,000,000.

The action for the embezzlement of \$37,000 against ex-Treasurer Gill of the town of Superior, Wis., will be withdrawn. Gill agrees to turn over the accounts and shortage to his successor.

The resolution requesting the immediate resignation of United States Senator Lindsay, passed by the Kentucky house, was also adopted by the senate by a vote of 25 to ten.

A committee composed of leading distillers and business men of Louisville has sent out circular letters to all distillers of Kentucky asking them to come into a mammoth stock company or pool.

Chris Merry, the Chicago peddler, recently convicted of beating and choking to death his wife, Pauline Merry, was sentenced to be hanged on February 18. This date is just three months after the murder was committed.

Wind and rain storms prevailed in the Mississippi states for a time last week, demoralizing telegraphic service and railroad travel. Many persons were injured and at St. Louis two persons were killed.

The Chicago Total Abstinence societies have declared a boycott on all grocers who operate bars where liquor is sold in connection with their establishments.

Thomas E. Watson will be the Populist candidate for governor of Georgia. The state convention meets on March 6 and a majority of the delegates already elected are said to be in favor of Watson for governor.

The Bloomsburg (Pa.) Car Manufacturing company has been awarded the contract to build 100 gondola cars by the Orange Free State Railway company of South Africa.

Chief Justice Barlow of the supreme court of Missouri has tendered Governor Stephens his resignation, to take effect February 1. Governor Stephens has announced that he will appoint A. W. Williams of Bondeville to fill the vacancy.

J. J. Kerns, a prominent druggist, was found dead at South Portsmouth, O., having been frozen to death. He was put off a Chesapeake and Ohio train while under the influence of cocaine.

The third week of the strike of the New England cotton-mill workers commenced Monday last, with no nearer prospects of a settlement than was apparent three weeks ago.

The case of Sheriff James Martin and his eighty deputies, charged with murder and felonious wounding of a core of striking miners at Leimer, Pa., September 10 last, is on trial in

the criminal court there.

John Magli, a wealthy farmer, committed suicide at his home, in Beaver township, Kas. The only known cause was his fear of being called as a witness against a local "joint" keeper.

The First National bank of Larimore, N. D., has failed.

Joseph McKenna took the oath of office for justice of the supreme court of the United States last week.

The public prosecutor demands a sentence upon Lieutenant-General Weyler of two months' imprisonment.

Lewis E. McComas has been elected United States senator from Maryland, to succeed A. P. Gorman. McComas is a Republican.

The work of paying the Indians on the Shoshone reservation their installment of the Hot Springs purchase money has been concluded. The share of each amounted to \$5.92, and over 400 checks were issued.

The Bar Iron association, controlling 75 per cent of the iron product of the country has advanced the price of its products \$2 per ton, and intimate that another raise will soon be made.

General Nestor Aranguren, a prominent soldier in the Cuban army was surprised while writing in a house and killed by Spanish troops.

The Ocean Bluff house, Kennebunkport, Me., was completely destroyed by fire. It was the largest summer hotel there, and was owned by the Kennebunkport Seashore company. Loss, \$75,000.

A majority of the striking engineers in England have voted in favor of accepting the terms of the employers. The exact figures have not yet been divulged, but the proportion is said to be about 25,000 in favor of acceptance and 11,000 against it.

After a hot debate the lower house of the Kentucky legislature adopted a substitute resolution, offered by Representative Nelson of Harding, calling on United States Senator Lindsay to resign if he cannot support the democratic platform.

After much discussion the Central labor union has passed a resolution opposing the bill pending in the New York legislature for the opening of the theaters of New York city on Sunday night.

The foundrymen of the country have just completed the formation of an organization to prevent strikes, and if they cannot prevent them to fight them. To this end wages will be kept the same in all parts of the country.

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
