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NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

The Spanish Minister in Trouble—Life Imprisonment For Luetgert—Fatal Fire in Pittsburg—Guatemala's President Assassinated.

There is apparently no change in the strike in New England states.

A stove trust is the latest addition to the combines of manufacturing interests.

About 3000 trouser-makers of New York, Brooklyn and Brownsville are on a strike for an increase in wages.

The trial of Sheriff Martin and his deputies for shooting strikers at Lattimer, Pa., last summer, is still going on.

Justice George B. McFarlane of the state supreme court of Missouri died at St. Louis, as the result of an operation for appendicitis.

Police Magistrate Ellis of Denver has declared the ordinance fixing the license fee of cigarette dealers at \$1000 per year to be excessive and therefore void.

Prince Albert of Flanders, heir presumptive to the Belgian throne, will shortly leave his native land for an extended tour through the United States.

Ensign Joseph C. Breckenridge, executive officer of the torpedo-boat Cushing, was washed overboard while the vessel was just outside the harbor of Havana during a storm. The body was recovered.

Archibald McLaren was bound over to the grand jury at Cleveland by a

police justice in \$5000 bail. McLaren is charged with embezzling \$15,000 from the Order of Scottish Clans, of which he was treasurer.

Fire in the large three-story building of the Chautauqua Lake Ice company occupying a block at Pittsburg, Pa., destroyed the building, causing a loss of \$2,000,000. Six persons were killed and several injured by falling walls.

The advisory committee of the Merchants' association of New York has decided to undertake the collection of fund sufficient to enable the board of directors to conduct a vigorous campaign against railroads which discriminate against their city.

John Schroder has just returned to San Francisco from the Klondike, with \$40,000 in gold nuggets. Schroder left San Francisco last July with the first gold hunters on the steamer Excelsior, borrowing money to make the trip. Beside the gold he brought with him he has a claim worth \$150,000.

Word has been received from the Arctic ocean to the effect that the revenue cutter Bear, the vessel sent to the relief of the imprisoned whalers at Point Barlow, reached Tunnoek village safely in the middle of December, just in time to avoid the ice crush. Relief has no doubt reached the whalers by this time.

President Barrios of Guatemala was shot and instantly killed at Guatemala City, while walking with two military officers near the palace. The assassin, a young man named Oscar Zollinger, a British subject, while attempting to escape, was killed by the president's staff. Manuel Estrada Cabrera, temporarily the constitutional successor, was peaceably installed. The murder was caused by political troubles.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, has been in New York for some days to get the unions of that city to enter into a great movement for an 8-hour work-day. According to the present plans of the labor leaders a demand for the 8-hour day will be made May 1 next that will involve fully a million men. The American Federation of Labor will make this demand in one trade at a time, and according to the leaders great strikes are expected before the battle likely to follow is ended.

General Marvoquin, commandante, and his staff, were assassinated in an interior room in the Cuartel, Guatemala. The victims were decoyed to the room by Marvoquin's predecessor, General Najero, who pretended that he desired to surrender his authority to his successor. As soon as General Marvoquin and staff reached the room they were set upon and stabbed and shot. The assassins also attacked one other party, killing several persons. Estimates place the dead from 16 to 30 as the result of the night's work.

A letter written by Minister De Lome, the Spanish representative at Washington, was made public last week. The mis-sive was addressed to a prominent Spaniard at Havana, and was stolen from him by a Cuban sympathizer who sent it to officials at Washington. The letter referred to President McKinley in a very complimentary manner and contained a scorching for Americans generally. As soon as the letter was made public De Lome sent his resignation to Madrid in order to avoid being recalled. Resolutions were introduced in congress requesting that De Lome be given his passports, and sent home in disgrace. De Lome admits the authorship of the letter.

The supreme court of Oregon has rendered a decision which grants to women the right of the franchise in all elections for school purposes.

Hector C. Bollong was shot and killed at Seattle by Andrew Annen, who a few minutes later blew his own brains out. The men were partners in a livery stable and a quarrel lead to the tragedy.

AT THE NATION'S CAPITOL.

Brief Notes Concerning the Doings of the Fifty-Fifth Session of Congress.

The Indian appropriation bill has passed the senate.

The senate has confirmed the nomination of William McMicken of Olympia to be surveyor-general of Washington.

The milling industry of the middle northwest is organizing to secure favorable action on the pure flour bill now before congress.

The controller of the treasury approved the application for a charter for the Commercial National bank of Santa Monica, Cal., with a capital of \$50,000.

State Senator J. M. Greaves of Redding has been recommended for the position of surveyor-general of California by the Republican congressional delegation.

Resolutions have been introduced in congress requesting President McKinley to notify Spain that the barbarous war now being waged in Cuba must be stopped.

The house committee on commerce killed the senate bill to permit the state of South Carolina to control liquors brought into the state in original packages. The motion to report it favorably was lost on a tie vote.

The president sent these nominations to the senate: John H. Burford, chief justice, and Bayard T. Hainer, associate justice of the supreme court, territory of Oklahoma; Edwin S. Cunningham, of Tennessee, to be consul at Aden, Arabia.

While boring an artesian well near Hanford, Cal., a flow of natural gas was struck.

Fire destroyed \$6600 worth of property in the business center of Marshfield, Or.

The new British Columbia parliament building at Victoria were opened last Thursday with great pomp.

The money and valuable papers belonging to the fugitive murderer, J. C. Dunham of San Jose, have been taken possession of by the sheriff and examined. They were in a small box and proved to be mortgages to the value of \$1400. There was also \$970 in coin in the box. Jacob Shessler, father of one of Dunham's victims, recently got judgment for \$8000 against Dunham, and the money and the mortgages, representing about \$2600, will be turned over to him.

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
