There are reasons to believe that the first shots to reach the Spanish ships will catch her in the stern.

Those Cubans who were to devastate the islands and drive the Spaniards into the sea the moment American support was sure seem to have changed their minds.

Look out for campaign lies sprung on the eve of election. Disregard them, as they are always unworthy of belief. No matter which party springs them. We are opposed to this method of obtaining votes at the last moment.

The whole of the Republican legislative ticket in this county must be elected and the county saved the odium of being connected with another "hold-up" legislature, as may possibly be the case should the fusion candidates be successful. Jackson County wants no more \$10,000 Howsers or his promoters and abettors to disgrace her in the Oregon legislature.

In 1894 the Salem Capital Journal circulated a petition requesting county superintendents to vote against a change of text books. J. H. Ackerman, republican candidate for superintendent of public instruction, who was county superintendent of Multnomah, voted in accordance with the prayer of the Journals petition. Now the Journal condemns him for the act, saying that Ackerman's vote on the text book question showed him to be a friend of the American Book Co. Mr. Ackerman was opposed, and is opposed now, to an unnecessary change of books, but Mr. Lyman the union candidate has always been in favor of a change, and is now pledged to bring about a change if elected. A vote for Lyman is a vote to change every text book in the state, which will cost school patrons a vast amount of money.

Remember that J. C. Pendleton, candidate on the republican ticket for Assessor is the gentlemen who has been so vigorous for the past three years in helping to bring the Jackson county fair up to its present high standard. Mr. Pendleton is a thorough business man, energetic in everything he undertakes, is one of the most successful farmers in the county, and a first class judge of property values.

Twenty years in general farming and stock raising, and five years in mercantile business gives him a knowledge of values that few men possess, and which will be of great use to the county in enabling him to quickly determine many cases of difficult property valuation. While the residents of the county will be dealt with equally and fairly, the outside holders of values will receive the attention they deserve and contribute their proper share to the tax fund of the county.

The Spanish fleet dodged once too often when it doeged into the harbor at Santiago. It found getting into the harbor an easy task, but the ships composing the fleet will never get out again, unless they are brought out under the American flag. That harbor is shaped like a very large bottle with a very small mouth. Our warships are outside the slightest trouble in destroying the Spanish ships as fast as they attempt to come out. It is possible that our ships may decide to go in after them, but it is not at all necessary that they should, as a comparatively small force can keep them where they are until they are starved out, and it may be considered good policy to follow the latter course and use our fleets for work elsewhere, that promises better result with less risk to our men and ships. The long and narrow channel to Santiago harbor is known to be heavily mined and for our ships to go in there would be extremely hazardous. The same result can be obtained by keeping the Spanish fleet shut up there; therefore it is more probable that the latter plan will be followed.

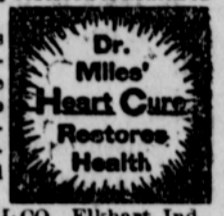
