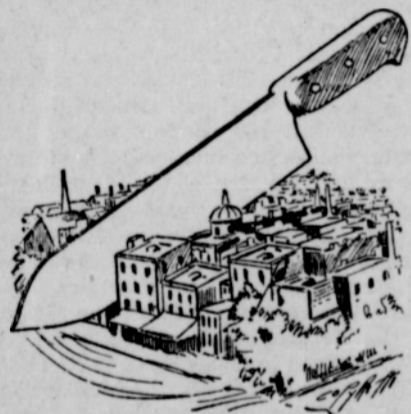

STATE NEWS NOTES.

The new Brownsville woolen mills was started up this week.

R. H. Wood, of Marshfield, has shipped 8000 boxes of apples this season.

A band of 4000 sheep, destined for Montana, were shipped from The Dalles Monday.

The Grants Pass Observer has discontinued its semi-weekly issue, and comes out as a weekly hereafter.

The Roseburg Review is preparing its annual descriptive edition which will be out Monday, January 2nd.

George Grayson, a Tillamook county man, caught 100 trout, that averaged three pounds each, in 20 minutes.

Several Klamath county cattlemen have recently sold cattle in San Francisco, receiving from 6 to 7½ cents or \$38 to \$40 per head.

The patrons of the Arago creamery have offered a reward of \$350 for the arrest and conviction of the parties that robbed the creamery fund.

About 1800 tons of coal was shipped from the Newport mine last week. The owners are still short-handed, and 40 more men could be used to good advantage.

Klamath county is now agitated over the irrigation proposition. Irrigation, says the Lakeview Examiner, will make Klamath one of the richest and grandest counties in the state.

Lem Love, of Wasco was married Wednesday of last week to Luella Golden, of Goldendale. If there's anything in names, this ought to be one of the happiest marriages we ever read about.

The Tillamook Lumbering Company has been rushing things the past few weeks getting out bills for the home market, principally for the fire sufferers who are rebuilding residences, barns, fences, etc.

A plucky woman is Miss Jessie Mitchell, of Washington county, who walked 28 miles between Saturday evening and Monday morning, into the mountains, where she had secured a school to teach.

An Umpqua valley farmer has presented the Oakland Gazette with two pears, the combined weight of which is 4 pounds and 10 ounces, the larger weighing 42 ounces, is 8½ inches in length and 15½ inches in circumference.

Ex-county Treasurer P. G. Morris, of Linn county, has been found short in his accounts \$3800.74 by the book keepers, who were authorized to expert his books. The shortage covers two terms of office, and the county court has issued an ordered for the ex-treasurer and his bondsmen to make good the shortage.

Judge Willis has commenced suit against A. M. Crawford to recover \$5000. The complaint alleges that while they were partners the latter collected a fee of \$10,000 from the Victory Mining Co. and failed to turn over to the plaintiff his share of it.
