There is nothing in all history which so nearly resembles Admiral Dewey's brave feat at arms as the destruction in Cadiz Bay of the Spanish fleet by Sir Francis Drake, on the same day of the same month just three hundred and eleven years ago.

For several years the cry has been that there were too many railroads in the country. Now the complaint is that the business of the country is taxing the railroads far beyond their capacity.

No part of the world equals North America in continued output of gold. The Wells-Fargo estimate of gold produced in the United States last year is \$66,486,202, and in British America \$11,975,000, a total of \$78,461,202. The total for the world exceeds \$250,000,000; and the annual total has been growing for years past. It is twice what it was ten years ago. This is the great fact that is leaving silver behind. Bryan talks about another silver campaign in 1900. But the very forces of nature and all the energies of man are against him. The increasing supply of gold confirms the standard, and silver is wanted only for divisional money, or change.

In 1792 the first Boston stage started for New York, and now 700 railroad trains are sent out of the city daily. Such is American expansion.—Ex.

An American publisher had the gall to send Emperor William of Germany a check for \$5,000 with the request to write for publication his opinion of the Spanish-American war. The Emperor sent the check to the German embassy at Washington with the order to return it to the publisher with the information that the Emperor was not anxious to become a "yellow journalist."

Eagan was appointed to the regular army from Washington territory in 1866, and was made captain of commissary in 1874. It is now proposed to raise \$2,000,000 for a Pacific ocean exposition to be held at San Francisco in 1901. The California state legislature will be asked for an appropriation of \$200,000, and congress for one of \$300,000. The scope of the exposition includes the states of the

Pacific slope, and the Central and South American, Asiatic, Siberian, Australian and Oceanic countries bordering on the Pacific ocean including the Philippines.

The gunboat Bennington left Honolulu recently for Manila. On her way there she will stop at Wake island, plant a 70-foot flag pole and raise the Stars and Stripes.

Representative Young of Clatsop has introduced a bill to make the term of county assessors four instead of two years; also one providing for county attorneys instead of district attorneys.

The Oregonian of last Monday was one of the most complete and valuable editions of any paper ever published in the Pacific northwest. The half-tone portion, or album was an excellent piece of work.

The 116 miles of railroad in Douglas county are assessed at an average of \$5,000 per mile, while in Jackson county the average is \$9,184, in Multnomah it is \$1739, including telegraph and telephone lines. The assessment in Douglas is the heaviest except Jackson county, Malheur comes in third, being \$4603. It appears that the location of roads in those counties where the property ought to be the most valuable are the counties assessed the lowest. Why so, is the question which excites criticism.—Roseburg Plaindealer.

STATE NEWS NOTES.

Lake county's tax levy is 25.7 mills.

Lakeview wants to bond itself for \$25,000 to put in a system of water works.

Ashland has levied an eight mill city tax. This is two mills less than last year's levy.

Horace Mann has sold the Cottage Grove Messenger to C. J. Edwards who will change the name to the Bohemia Nugget.

Hay in the stack is bringing \$12 a ton and more in different parts of eastern Oregon. Stock will certainly suffer if the storms now prevailing continue.

J. C. Lyons of Mill City, Linn county was shot through a window of his residence last Friday as he was about to retire for the night. The assassin is unknown.

Lloyd Smith, a Lewisville boy, has constructed an engine out of tomato cans, metal cartridge shells, wheels from an apple-peeler, a soldering-iron and a stick of solder.

During the week the Portland flouring mills purchased different lots of wheat aggregating 40,000 bushels. The price paid was on a basis of 62 cents per bushel, sacked.

During the year 1898 the county clerk of Lane county issued 156 marriage licenses to people in Lane county. During the same period the circuit court of Lane county dissolved the marriage vows in 32 cases.

The latest death reported among the Oregon Volunteers at Manila is that of Wistar Hawthorne, son of Prof. B. J. Hawthorne of the state university, a member of Co. "C" of Eugene. The news was received by cablegram, Monday, and the cause of death was given as paralysis of the heart.

E. A. Anderson, the unfortunate S. P. fireman, who met with such a frightful accident, last Friday, at Rice Hill, Douglas county, in falling to the rails between an engine and tender which had parted, died in the hospital at Portland, Monday. He was interred at Eugene.

Judge Burnett has granted a stay of execution in the case of W. H. Magers, sentenced to be hanged for the murder of A. R. Sink last summer, in the shape of certificate of probable cause. Magers is now confined in the Polk county jail at Dallas. The case will be submitted to the supreme court in a few days.

Representative E. V. Carter has introduced a bill, amending the statutes so that the sale of property of delinquent taxpayers may be made without levying upon (or posting notices on) the property. This is a good law and will save the county considerable money. We hope the bill will pass and become a law.

If parents enforce strict obedience at home teachers will have but little trouble at school.

Warrants have been drawn in the secretary of state's office and are ready for distribution to members of the Oregon National Guard who volunteered for service in the war with Spain and were rejected by reason of physical imperfections. The payment of the rejected men was authorized by an act passed at the special session of the legislature. Only those whose names appear on the list approved by the adjutant-general will be paid. The aggregate amount to be disbursed is \$3315.
