Governor Geer performed his first act of executive clemency today, granting a full pardon to George F. McConnell, who was sentenced to the penitentiary in November, 1896, from Multnomah county, for embezzling funds belonging to the Knights of Pythias. McConnell was released September 15, 1898, since which time he has resided in Jackson County, where he has made many friends. The pardon carries with it restoration to citizenship, which was recommended by Speaker Carter, Senator Cameron, State Printer Leeds and Representative Sherwin and Stewart, of this county and Freeland, of Morrow, who testified to McConnell's exemplary conduct since his release.
