MONDAY'S CONVENTION.—There was a large crowd of citizens gathered at the school house hall last Monday night for the purpose of nominating a ticket to be voted on at the coming election in April. A. R. Merritt was selected as chairman of the meeting and W. A. Carter secretary. J. H. Beeman, J. B. R. Morelock and J. W. Marksbury were selected as tellers. I. E. Deboy, H. C. McNeil, A. S. Moon, W. H. Rannels, J. W. Marksbury, Sam Tweedy, T. J. Downing and W. H. Stichel were placed on nomination for trustees. On taking the vote the ballot stood as follows: Deboy 37, McNeil 40, Moon 32, Rannels 20, Marksbury 36, Tweedy 32, Downing 39, Stichel 22 and scattering votes 3. Moon and Tweedy being tied a second ballot was taken of which Moon received 20 votes and Tweedy 33. For Recorder W. A. Carter received 49 votes and J. B. R. Morelock 6. There were three up for the marshalship, Walter Dungey received 30 votes, L. F. Pate 19, and J. H. Beeman 4. This leaves the citizens ticket as follows: For Trustees, I. E. Deboy, H. C. McNeil, J. W. Marksbury, Sam Tweedy and T. J. Downing. For City Recorder, W. A. Carter. For Marshal, Walter Dungey.
