STATE NEWS NOTES.

Pheasants and grouse are very
plentiful along Coos river this year

To date, Sheriff Withers, of Lane
county, has issued 4272 receipts for
taxes.

The Southern Pacific Company
pays taxes amounting to \$16,196.39
in Lane county.

It has been no uncommon thing
of late for persons to get hold of
counterfeit coins. Counterfeit quar-
ters are becoming very common.

Thomas Beatty, a machinist, aged
43, was received at the asylum
Tuesday from Lane county. The
expense of conveyance was \$23.65.

Claude Brenton, who is condemned
to be hanged at Eugene. Friday for
the murder of John Linn, is con-
fident that Governor Geer will
commute his sentence.

Eliza Davis, who attempted to
rob Owen Kee in Marshfield a short
time since, failed to put in an ap-
pearance before the grand jury, and
will forfeit the \$300 (cash) bonds
she put up.

A letter in the Eugene Guard,
signed "Roseburger," says that 21
murders have been committed in
Douglas county since 1859. There
has been but one execution, and
that was a case of lynch law.

Arguments and petitions for the
commutation of the sentence of
Claud Branton, sentenced to be
hanged in Eugene today, were pre-
sented to Gov. Geer last Tuesday.
Whether the Governor will interfere
remains yet to be seen.

Claude Branton, the condemned
murderer, has been playing "pedro",
the last few nights with Guard
John Holland, and lost each night.
In a jovial spirit he remarked to
Holland after Sunday night's game
that he would have to play a stiff
game from now on to win the series.

A boy in Ellensburg, Washing-
ton by the name of Milligan has a
head for business on him. Recent-
ly he began collecting parts of bi-
cycles, such as spokes, bearings; in
fact, any and all portions of wheels
and the result is a very good wheel,
which he is now riding at a cost to
him of but 75 cents.

Ed Savage and John Long, of
Haines, ran to earth and killed
nine coyotes, three miles from that
town. They killed the mother
coyote and dug out of a hole in the
ground her eight young ones, six of
which were female varmints. At
\$2 a piece for each scalp, the men
will receive \$18 bounty for their
work.

Lake county is the 13th county
to pay its 1898 state taxes in full, a
remittance from it of \$149.09 hav-
ing been received at the state treas-
urer's office Tuesday. The total
amount due was \$9376.17, but the
legislature authorized the state
treasurer to credit an overpayment
of \$227.08 on 1892 taxes on the
1898 account of the county.

Seven years ago the people of
Tillamook county turned their at-
tention to dairying. Since that
time more than a dozen creameries
have been successfully established
in the county. In the year 1898
these creameries turned out 17,347

pounds of butter and 81,831 pounds
of cheese which netted the farmers
patronizing these creameries; \$18,
614.

New Military Company Mustered in. All
Sons of Veterans.

Military matters took on quite an
air of activity at Grants Pass this
week, during the visit of Adjutant-
General Tuttle and Captain T. T.
Strain. They mustered into the
state service 50 fine young fellows,
all of whom are sons of veterans
and inherit the military instinct.
Abraham Axtel, who was elected
captain of the new company, is a
veteran of the civil war, ex-mayor
of Grants Pass, and now county
judge. E. B. Brown, the first lieu-
tenant, was in Nebraska when the
war with Spain began. He enlisted
in the Nebraska regiment and went
to Manila with it, recently return-
ing. James Tait, the second lieu-
tenant, has had much military ex-
perience in the California National
Guard, and First Sergeant Wolfer
has served four enlistments in the
Oregon National Guard. This
makes the 10th company mustered
into the new National Guard.

The men were examined by Dr.
Moore, and seven were rejected.

The officers were examined by
the visiting Officials, and passed
with flying colors. General Tuttle
and Captain Strain held a school of
instruction for officers and non-
commissioned officers, all of
whom were well informed in
the duties devolving upon them.

So the new company starts off
very well.

General Tuttle says that he
found Grants Pass a very flourish-
ing place. The mining and other
industries are very active, and the
local climatic conditions are del-

John Cleaver marshal, and the
county officers, J. C. Pomell judge
Jas. Elkins clerk. C. W. Richard-

S. G. Irvine superintendent. Ad-
dison C. Gibbs governor and R. P.
Boise circuit judge, and a memo-
randum. "This court house was
built in the year 1865 by Perry
Watson for \$33,000."— Albany
