The decision in this case upholds his trade mark and renders all parties liable who fraudulently attempt to profit by the extensive "Foot-Ease" advertising, in placing upon the market a spurious and similar appearing preparation, labeled and put up in envelopes and boxes like Foot-Ease. Similar suits will be brought against others who are now infringing on the Foot-Ease trade mark and common law rights.

STORIES OF THE SPANISH WAR

"There was the time the Spanish fooled the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh volunteers, for instance."

"How was it, lieutenant?" asked somebody.

"Why, it was the sharpest trick you ever heard of, and simple as A B C. You know, the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh is made up of men from New York City—all heroes, of course, but still they are accustomed to the civil walks of life. And the civil walks of life, taken literally, nowadays, are peculiar paths. It was at San Juan. The regiment had been ordered to advance and lie down close among some low bushes. The Spaniards were only a short distance in front. The firing had ceased in that neighborhood and all was still. Our men were in a state of intense though suppressed excitement. You could never guess what those crafty Spaniards did. Suddenly they rang a bicycle bell, and followed it with a cable car gong. The Hundred and Twenty-seventh jumped into the air as one man. The Spaniards blazed away and tried to take 'em on the wing. Of course, they didn't hit a thing, because Spaniards never do; but if they had been good shots they might have bagged the whole regiment. And I would not be surprised if they'd had an elevated road guard to yell 'Step lively!' that they could have stampeded every last man."—Harper's Bazar.

Now that the volunteers are back, the opportunities for obtaining at first hand a knowledge of the real horrors of war are perceptibly increased. Two Chicago boys who were together at Santiago, growing reminiscent, disclosed a fearful fact yesterday.

"I have often wondered," said one, "and now that we are back home, I want to know why you reported for sick call about four days out of every week and yet never seemed any more sick than I was?"

TRUCK HANDLE FOR BARRELS.

Tonglike Device for Lifting and Carrying Bulky Packages.

A barrel is an exceedingly awkward thing to handle, and in establishments where they are moved in large numbers quite a considerable amount of time is lost in placing them on the hand trucks on which they are conveyed and in removing them therefrom. In order to facilitate this loading and unloading a unique truck has been invented by Theodore T. Dickerson, of Trimble, Ala. It consists of the combination with the axle of curved gripping jaws, more like a great pair of plumber's pinchers than anything else. The levers operating the jaws form the handles of the truck. In practice the truck is run up to the barrels and the jaws clamped around the bottom, and

then raised, the whole procedure consuming but a few seconds. The two lever arms are held firmly together by a linking clasp, with a spring-pressed ratchet, which is easily released for unshipping the barrel.

The Mexican War.

The whole number of men in the war with Mexico was 101,282, including regulars and volunteers. The war lasted about two years. Some pretty lively fights were made, notably Resaca de la Palma, Buena Vista and the assaults of Chapultepec and other outposts of the Mexican capital. Yet the casualties were comparatively trifling. Killed in battle, 1,049; died of wounds, 508; total, 1,557. Less by about 100 than the Federal loss at the battle of Chickamauga.

High Salaried Clergymen.

New York has numerous instances where clergymen receive from \$10,000 to \$20,000. The late Dr. Hall, of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church had \$20,000 and a manse. Henry Ward Beecher was paid \$20,000 a year, which barely sufficed to maintain his Peekskill farm. Bishop Potter has \$15,000 with a rectory, with its upkeep thrown in.

Artificial Limbs.

Artificial legs and arms were in use in Egypt as early as B. C. 700. They were made by the priests, who were the physicians of that early time.

Soldier Blankets.

The blankets issued to the soldiers of our army cost the Government \$3.40 each.

A curious state of things was observed in investigating the electrolysis of water pipes in Dayton, O., in which it was found that stones and pebbles near the pipes in some cases seem to have been electroplated with the metal of the pipes, which one of the experts believes has never been observed before.
