STATE NEWS NOTES.

At Lakeview, wool sales have been made as high as 12 4-5 cents.

A case of smallpox is reported from Summerville, Wailowa county.

The talk of the day at North Yamhill is a hen's egg that weighs five ounces.

Express offices will soon be established at Lakeview, Paisley and Silver Lake.

Over \$8000 net has been collected in Multnomah county to build bicycle paths.

Ex-Railroad Commissioner J. B. Eddy is the new editor of the Cottage Grove Times.

The Coos county pioneers will hold their annual meeting in Marshfield, August 15.

The total cost to Polk county from the time of holding the corner's inquest in the Magers-Sink case up to date is \$3,700.

John Felcher, who has just finished a three years' cruise on the battle-ship Oregon, has returned to his home at Coquille. Mr. Felcher was captain of the starboard bow gun on this famous ship, and claims the distinction of firing the fatal shot that crippled Cervera's flagship and sent it ashore.

W. C. Elliott, of Portland, who has a contract from the government for surveying the boundary lines of the Klamath Indian reservation, part of which was completed last fall, arrived at Klamath Falls the other day. There is still about 100 miles of survey to be completed, and Mr. Elliott has secured the services of J. A. McCall, of Ashland, to take charge of the work, which will require nearly two months.

BIG STRIKES IN BOHEMIA

Honeycomb Ore That Runs \$25,000 To The Ton.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., June 27.—Information reached here this evening of big strikes in the Bohemia mining district. Reed and Fletcher of Montana, have struck it rich in a tunnel 350 feet long. The ore runs up to \$25,000 per ton. The ore is of honeycomb character, and the gold can be seen with the naked eye. The vein is about eight feet wide, with a rich streak in the center. Men have been working on this tunnel all winter.

The Helena mine, belonging to Jennings Bros. & Bruneau, which has been showing up so well the last few months, made a big strike.

Two veins about two feet apart have been uncovered, that are literally lined with gold. Three thousand dollars a day can be cleaned up with a hand motor.

James Sears, who has one of the extensions of the Helena, while doing development work the other day, struck a vein of ore, showing rich free gold. The ore is honeycomb in character, and free milling.

Much excitement prevails in Bohemia district. Every outgoing stage is loaded with goldseekers.

Judge George is telling a story about his gardener, and it is worth repeating. His honor's garden had been going the way of the neglected for weeks. Ragged holes appeared in the cabbage leaves, the asparagus withered, the peas passed into a swift decline. The gardener wrought diligently among the wasting vegetation, but to no purpose. Train leaves Ashland July 4th, 7:15 a. m., stopping at all points along the line, arriving at Grants Pass in time for the parade.
