A total of \$8 500,000 in gold coin was shipped to Europe during the first seventeen days of June. This gold export does not cause apprehension, being considered as mere borrowings by foreign bankers. Experience has shown that in a time of normal conditions these movements regulate themselves, and with an advancing prosperity at this end of the line, as shown in the fact that the volume of business for the first day of the month of June was about 34 per cent. larger than last year, our people can afford to indulge a feeling of financial security to which for some years they were strangers.

Considerable money is being invested in the mines in Southern Oregon at the present time. And those who are making the purchases are proceeding at once with improvements, making ready for a good winter's work. The next year will prove a lively one in the mining industry in this section. It takes money to do great work and that money is coming, not in appearance but in fact.

When Senator Stewart, of Nevada, says the United States "can neither sell nor abandon the Philippines," he shows he has a level head on some things. Stewart would be all right on the money question if he didn't have to depend on the voters of the little silver borough of Nevada. His original argument for the gold standard, by the way, has never been answered.

Ohio newspapers are going to try to decide who is the prettiest girl in Ohio. After the award there will be but one female newspaper reader in the state.

In the history of cities the growth of Chicago is without a parallel. Sixty-two years ago, or in 1837, the population of Chicago was 4170; in 1847 it was 16,859, in 1855 it had grown to 80,000, in 1860 it was 100,206, in 1866 it rose to 200,418, in 1870 it reached 306,605, in 1880 it was 503,185, in 1890 it was 1,098,576, in 1899 it is estimated at 2,000,000. Other cities, indeed—London and New York—have had greater aggregate growth since 1837 but Chicago has grown from nothing. Paris has had wondrous growth. At the beginning of the century it had about 900,000 inhabitants. It now has 2,540,000. Berlin's growth has been only less marvelous than that of Chicago. In 1840 Berlin has less than 300,000 inhabitants. It now has 1,750,000.

GOLD HILL DITCH.—J. S. Howard chief engineer in the employ of the Gold Hill High Line Ditch Company, is in Portland purchasing supplies and engaging men to go on the permanent survey of the line, which begins above Gold Hill. The locating and cross-sectioning of the canal will consume the time of 16 men for a period of three months. When the survey is finished, estimates will be made of the work in the various sections and contracts let.—Sunday Oregonian.

J. S. Howard came to Gold Hill Thursday night and commenced the survey this morning and by tonight will have three miles of grade stakes set. After setting 12 miles of these permanent grade stakes, he will start and set back stakes and cross section and traverse the line of the ditch.

COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES.

A visit to No. 3 found Fannie Donegan busy with an interesting bevy of scholars who were doing good work.

Iva Purdin is having her first experience as a full fledged school ma'am in No. 34. She takes to the work quite naturally and the scholars seem quite tractable in her hands.

Steamboat district is a community entirely cut off from other districts by high mountains, but a more enterprising people and better school would be hard to find. We had the pleasure of meeting one member of the board, H. C. Shearer, and enjoyed the hospitality of the pleasant home of the Clerk A. W. Shearer, and from what we learned of the teacher, Dottie Day, the people insist on having a good school, and know when they are getting it.

A circular issued by Superintendent Ackerman states that the next examination for state papers will be held at the same time as that for county papers Aug. 9-10-11. After the next August examination, questions will be taken as follows: All questions in theory and practice, and one-fifth of the questions in arithmetic, grammar, geography and reading will be taken from White's Elements of Pedagogy. All the questions in Literature will be taken from Smith's Studies in English Literature; and all questions in Psychology will be taken from Buell's Essentials of Psychology. Good reasons are given for this. Teachers preparing for examination will know how to proceed on these topics.

The educational rally of the schools in the Applegate country was far more successful than was anticipated by the most sanguine. Before ten o'clock last Saturday morning loads of happy school children began to arrive at the grounds which had been selected near the Bridge Point school house. When the exercises began there were about three hundred people present, mostly from five schools in Jackson and Josephine counties though there were representatives from four other schools. Pupils from each school had prepared selections, excellent in quality and ample in quantity which with the papers presented by the teachers, Daisy Stites, C. P. Snell and P. M. Corum made a program of nearly three hours duration. After an hour in the grove the rain threatened to bring the exercises to a close when Mr. O. E. Rare invited every body to his hall and most of the crowd adjourned to the welcome shelter where the program was finished. Prof. C. S. Price of Grants Pass, Mrs. Dr. Mushett of Ruch, Mr. Vogeli of Applegate, and the superintendent made appropriate remarks after which the company adjourned to a banquet which had been spread by the ladies. It was the general opinion that much good would result from the rally. Enthusiasm in school work was aroused, children encouraged to push forward in their studies and a fraternal spirit between patrons and teachers fostered. There has not been a more beneficial educational gathering in the county. Much credit is due Miss Daisy Stites for the successful issue of the enterprise.

MERCHANTS' PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION.

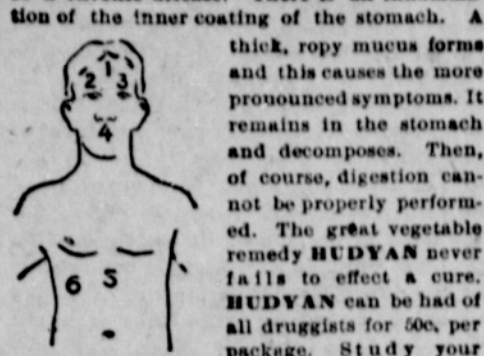

A secretary has been employed whose duty will be to furnish each member of the association with a complete list of the bad accounts which list will be continually revised.—Ashland Tidings.
