The one should be cleaned daily and the other well littered with straw, and the straw removed as often as it becomes dirty. A rubbing post in the inclosure will be of advantage. Also place in a trough, under shelter, a mixture of pulverized charcoal, ashes and salt.

Stewed Cucumbers,-Pare the large cucumbers, cut lengthwise into four parts, and remove the large seeds. Soak them half an hour in cold water. Cook in boiling salted water to cover until tender. Drain off the water; add a little butter, salt and pepper, and, make a thin white sauce and pour

The young sow, bred for the first time, should be treated differently from the matured sow, as regards the amount of feed given. She should be fed all she will eat up clean, of shelled oats, shorts, bran and a little oil meal, with about two ears of corn daily, as there is little danger of her becoming too fat; a greater part of the feed consumed and assimilated going to make growth, and to supply nourishment for her young.
