THE SUGAR BEET.

In our article of last week on sugar beet raising in this county, we omitted one of the best features of the industry, and that was that the pulp from the sugar beet will pay the farmer all it costs to raise them, as it is one of the very best of stock foods, both for horses and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, etc.

Hon. James Wilson, of Iowa, Secretary of Agriculture, who has just returned from a trip up the Columbia river as far as the great Grande Ronde valley has this to say of the sugar beet industry in that part of the State:

"I was very much pleased with what I saw of the sugar-beet industry in the great Grand Ronde valley. I saw 3500 acres in sugar beets near La Grande, and consider the industry a great success. Why, that fine valley could supply sugar for the whole of the United States. But it should be done in connection with dairying. As soon as the dairymen find out that the sugar-beet is worth raising for pulp alone to feed to dairy cows and have the sugar for clear profit, then it will be demonstrated that we can produce sugar as cheap as in the tropics—at a cost of 2 cents a pound, with present conditions of cheap labor—as against 3½ cents in the United States, with our conditions and dear labor.

"Pulp of the sugar beet is an excellent dairy feed, and all land east of The Dalles will raise sugar beets if irrigated. And the Columbia is such a magnificent river flowing past, that some means will be found to raise its water 40 feet and make millions of acres productive. In Southern Texas I saw water being raised to such lands by Corliss engines, and whole townships were thus raising rice and making fortunes out of the industry.

"I found the Grand Ronde sugar beets in fine condition; 162 boys from Utah, who understand their culture, had been brought to the fields and had completely cleaned them of weeds. There is no one thing I have seen on the coast that has pleased me more than the sight of these beets.

"I saw, at La Grande, one of the most magnificently appointed and arranged beet-sugar factories. It is abreast of the times, and its product is 99.6 pure. The people there are going to make money. Failure to realize profit last year was because of inexperience—the industry was in its experimental stage. Such first failures occur everywhere.

"The conditions required for successful sugar-beet raising are: Proper climate; rich soil, limestone, good water, cheap fuel; all these the Grand Ronde valley possesses. I can't imagine anything lacking. The valley can produce sugar for the nation and butter for all the Orient—the two staples must go together."

We notice a number of our citizens making a practice of lighting

fires with coal oil. This is a very dangerous thing to do and more so at this season of the year than any other time. Things are very dry now and should a fire once get started in Gold Hill it would be all off. People cannot be too careful along this line. The most of the people of this city are poor people and can not afford to lose their property. A word of warning should be sufficient.

Elihu Root, of New York, has been tendered and has accepted the secretaryship of war.

(Elihu Root was born at Clinton, N. Y., February 15, 1845, and graduated at Hamilton college and the New York university law school. He was admitted to the bar in 1867, since which time he has been in active practice in New York City. He was one of the most prominent members of the New York state constitutional convention, when he served as chairman of the judiciary committee.)

It is an old mining camp and has seen lively times in the old mining days. Activity has been renewed there considerably in the last few years.

COMING HOME IN A BODY.—A letter received last Monday from Major Percy Willis of the Second Oregon volunteers, now at the Presidio, by Eugene Willis of Salem, says the regiment will be mustered out August 7, and will reach Portland August 10. "The regiment," the letter says, "will stop and parade at Ashland, Roseburg, Eugene, Albany and Salem and then finally at Portland." It is stated that the regiment will come home in a body.

SOUTHERN OREGON GOLD.

Steadily Coming to the Front Under Intelligent Development.

J. R. Cunningham, who is interested in the Standard Mining Company, is an enthusiast upon the subject of Southern Oregon mines, and says that people who have never visited that section have little idea of the vast mineral resources of that part of the state. He says the indications are that the whole country between Glendale and Gold Hill a distance of perhaps 75 miles, is rich in mineral, mostly gold and copper. The Standard Mining Company has a force of men sinking a shaft on a 12-foot vein with the most promising results. Working test gives an average of over \$13 per ton in gold. The company will continue developing its property to a depth of 100 feet and will tunnel each way from the bottom of the shaft for a distance of 100 feet. If the mine continues in richness to the above extent, a mill will be erected to work the ore. While the company is confident that the mine will be a great producer of gold, and, taking into consideration the favorable facilities for working the ore, one of the best paying mining properties in the state, yet there are many rich veins of quartz in the foothills bordering on Rogue river which contain gold in paying quantities, and only require capital to put them in a condition to yield handsome returns for the money invested. The property of the Standard Mining Company is situated on the head of Sardine creek, about eight miles from Woodville, in Jackson county.

This section of the country has, since an early day, been noted for its rich placer mines, and every winter the great hydraulic giants continue to tear down the hillsides, for the gold which one day was deposited in some vein of quartz, but for some reason was forced from its hiding place into the gravel and streams below, where the prospector could more easily discover its whereabouts. Mr. Cunningham predicts for Southern Oregon the greatest success as a mining country. It is attracting the attention of business men all over the country, who, with their capital and energy, will give it the consideration it deserves.

The above taken from the Oregonian is correct as far as it goes. Gold Hill in Jackson county, is almost the very center of this gold belt. Within a radius of 3 miles of this city more than 100 gold bearing veins with pay chutes on the surface can be counted by anyone who will take the trouble to do so, and the only desideratum is water to work these veins, which will be furnished by the Gold Hill High Line Ditch Company as soon as that great work can be finished. There is one thing, however, that we are sorry to say, and that is there are people in this county and vicinity that do try to discourage every mining man that comes to this part of the country, by telling him or them that this is only a "pocket" country; that the ledges don't go down; but are superficial. This is doing a great wrong to every miner and prospector in this vicinity and county, as it discourages them in their every effort to uncover these rich veins of ore that the world may see and know just what we have in the way of properties that will pay anyone who has capital to develop them.
