How to Dissect a Mosquito.

A needle held in the left hand is passed through the thorax, the legs and wings are pulled off, and, if necessary, the scales of the body brushed off with a camel's hair brush. The tail is then lowered into a drop of water, salt solution or weak formalin placed on a glass slide, and with another needle held in the right hand the last two segments of the tail are partially separated and held down upon the slide. The left hand is then moved in such a manner as to draw away the insect. —Major Ross, M. S., in Indian Medical Gazette.

Teacher—Now, then, boy No. 1, who wrote "Macbeth?"

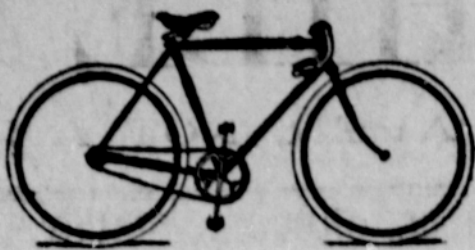
Boy No. 1 (trembling violently)—Please, sir, I didn't.

A FINE CLEVELAND BICYCLE

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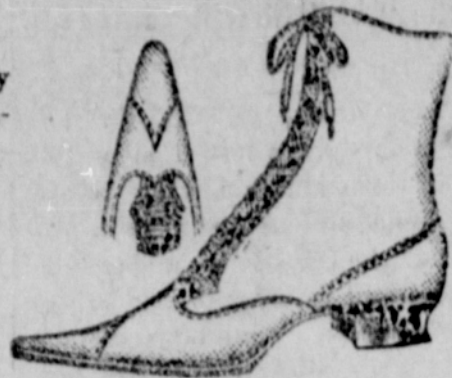

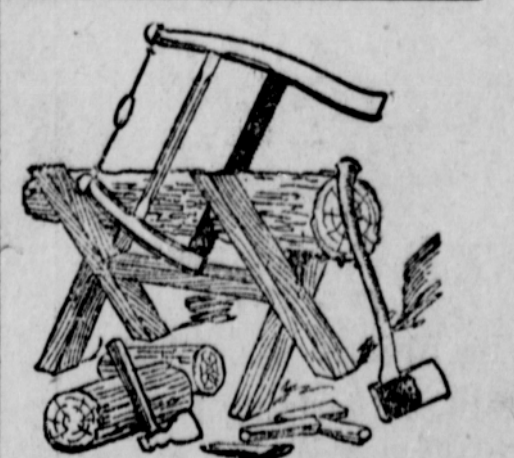
