The expected exodus of American capital and brains to Havana has not yet materialized. It takes a Klondike gold strike to make men brave death.

The Census Bureau will soon take up for consideration the question as to how many varieties of Democrats there are in the country. The problem is a knotty one.

The extreme length of the session of the Senatorial Committee to consider the financial question may be accounted for by the fact that they are held at a famous summer resort.

Champ Clark predicts the nomination and election of Bryan "unless death intervenes." This saying clause may be all that will sustain Clark's reputation as a prophet.

The disparity between a \$75,000 reception in New York and a \$11,000 gift house in Washington, will doubtless cause Admiral Dewey to wonder why the figures were not reversed.

Havemeyer, who was allowed by the Democrats to fix up the sugar schedules in two Tariff bills, voted for Cleveland in 1888 and 1892 and for Bryan in 1896. It is no wonder he denounces the Tariff. It has clipped the profits of his trust materially.

The suggestion has been made that the Philippines be converted into a penal colony and the penitentiaries of the forty-five states be emptied and dumped into the Islands. This proposition is another indication that the "dog days" are at hand.

While the American newspapers are roasting William W. Astor for giving up his American citizenship to become an English subject, the Prince of Wales has made friends in America by his reported snubbing of Astor who was continually boring the Prince by his snobbish attentions.

The eight transports for the Philippines now in the harbor of San Francisco are being prepared for the earliest possible start. General Otis has asked for rapie fire guns, which are especially adapted to the warfare in the Philippines. The Ordnance Bureau has ordered the guns shipped.

Prosperity is made by the Tariff and the trusts are encouraged by prosperity. Therefore it may be urged that the Tariff is the mother or rather the grand-mother of the trusts. But the people prefer prosperity, even if a few trusts are formed, than Free-Trade and adversity, as was the case under the Wilson law. The trusts are not a drop in the bucket.

The Democratic press is trying to make some capital out of the statement made by Sugar King Havemeyer, that "the Tariff is the mother of trusts." The facts are Mr. H. is sour because he did not succeed in securing a higher Tariff on sugar, so that his trust could not be interfered with. The policy of the Republican Tariff is to give consumers the commodities of life at the lowest possible price consistent with the demands of revenues

and the Protection of American labor. No one, Democrat or Republican, will have any sympathy with Mr. H. when the animus of his expression is understood.

An exchange says that one of the best arguments in advertising other than newspapers is contained in the following excerpt: A local merchant asked the other day, "Have you noticed the fine advertisement I have on the fence out west of town?" "No," replied the customer, "but if you will send the fence around to my house some day I will read it over and see what you and dealing in. Fact is, I'm reading newspapers and don't get much time to study fenceology."

The Navy Department is closely watching developments in Haiti and San Domingo. Haiti is in a state of ferment, perhaps out of sympathy with the neighboring state of Santo Domingo. United States Minister Powell cabled the State Department that the presence of a warship may be required to protect the United States legation and consulates. The New Orleans and the Machias are now at San Domingo, only half a day's sail from Haiti's capital, Port au Prince.

The first of the week we received a letter from Milo P. Ward from which we publish the following extract:

There has been great drouth throughout California the past 3 years and they who own water ditches are reaping a harvest of gold. I was talking in Los Angeles the other day with a man who owns a ranch of 100 acres down here, which he had just been irrigating. He had used 12 inches of water 8 hours per day for 16 days and his water bill was \$96.00. At Redlands \$3.50 per inch per 24 hours is no unusual price for water. A new company there recently expended \$100,000 to bring 100 more inches of water to the town which they are selling at \$3.50 per inch per 24 hours or \$350 per day for their 100 inches. Another Co. has recently bought the right to 100 inches paying therefor \$100 per inch, and now must pump the water and then pay the cost of constructing a pipe line to bring it to consumers. The cheapest water I have heard of here is at Riverside, where they have an abundant supply; and yet the price there is from 13 to 15 cents per inch per 24 hours. Generally speaking the title to one inch of water down here is considered worth \$1500. It seems to me that if the owners of the water of the various creeks in the vicinity of Gold Hill were down here awhile they would realize what fortunes they possess even in the small water supply of those creeks if it was reserovoid and carefully husbanded and scientifically handled on the rich hydraulick ground in that land of gold. It seems to me they could make more money raising gold from the bedrock there than the fruit men can make here raising oranges if the water was appreciated as here where never a single drop is lost or goes to waste.

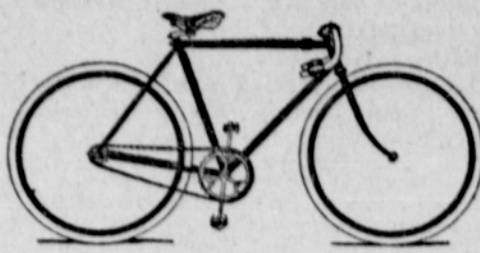
I have been up and down this coast from B. C. to Mexico and in my judgement Southern Oregon possesses the greatest placer gold fields on earth; and no where are they richer in the precious metal than in the vicinity of Gold Hill. And the quartz ledges are there also from which came this placer gold. With the water of the various creeks properly husbanded, with stamp mills operated by water power on the rippling Rogue, and with monitors operated by the proposed 10,000 inches from the Gold Hill High Line Ditch why shall not Gold Hill become the greatest mining camp on all the earth. Let the band play.

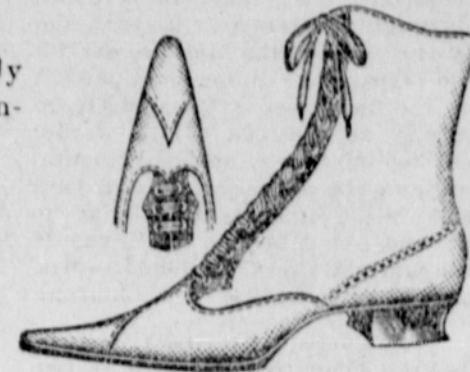

proportion of it is used for grazing purposes, the Government deriving no benefit from such use. The grazing lands are in many cases situated in and adjacent to sections which could be highly developed by irrigation methods, and there can be no question that in some of the grazing States great benefits would accrue to the States, to the people of those States and eventually to the people of the whole United States if the grazing lands could be leased and made to bring in a revenue, which could then be applied directly to the construction of irrigation ditches, etc.
