STATE NEWS NOTES.

Wood is \$9 per cord at Kent, in Sherman county.

The Milton Eagle has just completed its 13th year.

Baker City has four cigar factories, employing 12 hands.

The St. Helen's jail has not had an inmate for several months.

Lake county pays \$4.25 a week each for the keep of its paupers.

Two young men in Eugene's high school are seeking to enlist in the Boer army.

The Oakland firm of Joy & Neff has failed, with liabilities of \$2808 and assets of \$2482.

C. B. Irvine has sold the Salem Sentinel and will retire from the newspaper business.

The Lake county court last week put its O. K. on 721 bounty scalps—one cougar, 47 wildcat and 673 coyote.

The tax levy for Wheeler county is reported by the Fossil Journal to be 25 mills, with the state levy to be added.

The Noonday Mining Company, of Bohemia, has just disbursed \$8000 in cash at Cottage Grove to its employees.

The Salem G. A. R. post, Sedgwick No. 10, has passed resolutions denouncing Senator Cullom's bill to pension deserters.

Aurora has a paper, the Borealis which made its appearance yesterday. It presents considerable local news. H. A. Snyder is its manager.

A prisoner in Sherman county's new \$10,000 courthouse dug through the wall and escaped. He was recaptured and returned through the hole.

Several country newspapers have had occasion to notify delinquent subscribers that the office woodpile is getting low, even if the winter is mild.

The democratic and populist county central committees of Malheur county will meet in Vale February 3. The Ontario advocate urges them to fuse.

The amount of money orders sold at the Tillamook postoffice last month was a record-breaker. Postmaster S-verance reporting that he received 4500, for 250 orders issued.

The Albany Democrat denies the report of a shipment of very heavy hogs from that town recently, saying they averaged only 300 pounds and the heaviest one weighed 640.

The Roseburg postoffice location is declared by the Review to be satisfactory. and the close proximity of an all night saloon is said to afford it immunity from robbery.

A movement is on foot to organize a cavalry troop of the Oregon National Guard in Sumpter. The necessary number of names has been secured and application will be made soon for mustering.

Wm. Stoker killed a large cougar on Catherine creek, Union county, Thursday. The beast, after being shot, made for the hunter, but expired at his feet. It was 10 feet long and weighed 150 pounds.

Four boys are serving a sentence in jail for bespattering a woman's home at Brownville with mud. The Times says that "from the appearance of the house, their fusillade would have put to shame the gunners of a Spanish warship."

A Salem editor lost his umbrella and is so gratified at its return that he prints the restorer's name in capital letters on the editorial page, with a demand that he be canonized and given a seat among the immortals.

Mice are reported by the North Yamhill Record to be destroying wheat in its neighborhood to an alarming extent. Farmers assert that while doing their fall plowing the number of mice they would plow up in one day would sometimes reach the thousands.

Lane county has ordered a \$300 monument placed over the grave of the late Charnel Mulligan, in the Springfield I. O. O. F. cemetery. Mr. Mulligan gave one-half of the original townsite of Eugene, 40 acres, to Lane county, but later died in destitute circumstances.

Mrs. A. J. Stewart, mother of Mrs. W. B. Stevens, of Albany, and Merchant F. K. Deuel, of Medford, died after a short illness, Monday morning, at Los Angeles. She had been with her husband in New Mexico for some time previous, and had just gone to Los Angeles for treatment.

Policeman Croner arrested two men, names unknown, early Tuesday morning in the act of entering F. E. Dunn's store by the rear door, in Eugene, with the evident intention of burglarizing. They are supposed to be tramps, and are held on a charge of vagrancy until the return of Deputy Prosecutor Harris, when a charge of burglary will probably be entered against them.

William Burbee, who has been in Junction City several days in the employ of the Oregon Telephone Company, was drowned in Lancaster slough, near that place, Monday afternoon. He left here on horseback to go to Harrisburg. The water being high, he probably missed his bearing and got in too deep water. The horse returned in the evening without a rider, and a searching party left early this morning, returning tonight with the recovered body. He was aged about 35, and had a wife and three children living in Salem. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. lodge of Salem.

COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES.

Helen Holton has closed a winter term in No. 64. That little school in the pine woods will be lonely now.

Teachers need to be very careful in making their reports to district clerks. See that every item is properly noted.

Galls Creek school is on the vacation list again. Miss Hattie Eaton having finished another term. The patrons are hoping to secure her for the spring term.

School clerks elected at the meeting in March should not forget that the 50 cent revenue stamp is still required on the bond. The expense is to be charged to the district.

Each clerk is expected to report the number of voters, for school purposes, in the district. In rural districts this is not difficult. In towns of over two thousand, Ashland and Medford, the superintendent can ascertain this as well as the clerk, but in all other places it must be reported as nearly as practicable.

The management of the state department of education is carefully systematized so that all reports must be accurate or they will not be accepted from the county superintendents. This necessitates more careful work by the district clerks. Every question should be answered and a cipher placed in each column where there is no other answer to be given.

The valuation of property in Jackson county being about one-fourth lower than last year, the five mill county levy for the school fund will not yield as much as last year. A number of districts are voting a special tax of from one to two mills to make up this deficiency since the entire tax for all purposes in the county would still be less for property owners that it was last year. It requires a ten days notice to call such special meetings and as the action of the voters must be filed with the county clerk before Feb. 1, in order to be placed on the assessment roll, there is no time to lose for those districts which intend to act in this matter.

The teacher's examination to be held in February, beginning on the second Wednesday, is for state papers only. No one under twenty one years of age can receive a state certificate or diploma, but the examinations may begin any time and if completed in three successive examinations the applicant may receive the certificate or diploma if twenty one years of age at the time of the last examination. State certificates can be issued only to those who have had thirty months teaching experience, at least nine of which shall be in Oregon, and diplomas to those who have had sixty months experience, fifteen of which shall be in Oregon. Instead of the teaching experience, required above, diplomas from first class normal schools and chartered institutions of university grade may be accepted, but no graduate or teacher of any rank from Oregon or any other state can receive a state paper without an examination in from eighteen to twenty one branches. The examination in Feb. will be held in Jackson county at a point on the main line of railroad which is most convenient to the majority of applicants. Those intending to enter the examination should notify the superintendent at once, in order that a place may be selected in due time. The next examination for county certificates will be held in April beginning at 9 o'clock on the second Wednesday.
