STATE NEWS NOTES.

Hay in Grande Ronde valley is
selling at \$6 a ton in the stack. In
Wallowa \$8 a ton is asked.

At Corvallis a local manufactur-
er of bicycles is making a good
wheel and selling it at \$50.

Postmaster Totten, of Glendale,
has tendered the department at
Washington his resignation.

A Crook county man has receiv-
ed a number of bob-white quails
and turned them loose on Ochoco
ranch.

A. E. Voorhies has purchased
the interest of Mr. Price in the
Grant's Pass Courier, and is now
its sole owner.

The annual report of W. H. S.
Hyde, recorder for the town of
Marshfield, shows \$6293.94 receipts,
and \$4747.40 disbursements.

Brakeman Harvey, who was held
to answer for assault on Winnie
Thorn, was promptly discharged
by the Southern Pacific Company.

Schuebel precinct, Clackamas
county, claims "a horse with a two
inch mustache on his upper lip that
many a young man might be proud
of."

The men working on the Grants
Pass sewer struck last week for
higher wages. They were receiving
\$1.50 per day, but wanted \$2, which
was refused.

Salem papers say it is as good as
settled that the Salem Flouring
Mills Company, whose plant was
burned there last fall, will rebuild
in the coming spring.

Newspapers from all parts of
Oregon complain that registra-
tion of voters is slow. Many warnings
are printed that "now is the time
to get in early and avoid the rush."

The cash register and a slot ma-
chine in the bar room of the Foley,
at La Grande, was robbed of \$77
the morning of the 18th, in the
temporary absence of the watch-
man.

Dr. N. Hudson, a Willamette val-
ley pioneer of 1851, but now living
at Cove, has read 125 books of the
U. T. library in the past 11 months.
He is 80 years of age, and does not
use glasses.

At a Heppner birthday dinner
the recipient, Judge Mallory, aged
81, was entertained by his wife, 77,
and his three sisters, 75, 77 and 79.
He has two brothers living, the
youngest of whom is 69.

So far this has been one of the
wettest and warmest winters on
record. A few more weeks of such
weather will start fruit buds, as
already the pussy willow and alder
blossoms are much in evidence.

The Grant county populist cen-
tral committee advises putting up a
straight ticket in county, state and
nation. John C. Luce character-
ized the fusion of 1896 and 1898 as
a scheme to disorganize the people's
party.

Counterfeit dollars and halves of
particularly excellent make and
finish have been turning up in con-
siderable number in the Lower Col-
umbia river country, says the As-
torian. They are nearly perfect in
size, color and ring, but a trifle
light in weight.

The leading merchants of Pendle-
ton have entered into an agreement
to refund the railroad fare to resi-
dents of near-by towns who will
buy \$20 worth of goods from them;
the purchasers to present receipts

for fare paid to the local railroad
agents. Quite an idea.

A barrel of whiskey supposed to
have come from the wreck of the
Brother Jonathan, which was lost
off Crescent City in 1865, was wash-
ed ashore last week, says the
Marshfield Coast Mail. The barrel
is in good condition, and the whisky
should be of rare quality.

An old cannon, brought to Ore-
gon in '61 or '62, "disappeared"
years ago in Lane county, has been
found; and the Eugene Gaurd sug-
gests that the Native sons secure it.
The cannon is old style, has some
wooden parts, is heavily wrapped
with rope, and encased in iron. A
cartridge is still in it.

The sentence of Wayne Drollin-
ger, sent up from Douglas county,
in June, 1897, under sentence of
five years, for stealing some flour,
was last week commuted. Commu-
tation was based upon the recommen-
dation of the sentencing judge,
and all the trial jurors, together
with a long petition from citizens
of the vicinity in which he lived,
and the assent of the district attor-
ney in the case.

Sheriff A. J. Neilon, of Lakeview,
exhibits the first matured nuts from
a black walnut that have been
grown in this country. But little
attention had been paid to the trees
as the experiment with English
walnuts here had proved a failure,
but now that these walnuts have
matured and have an excellent
flavor, there is every reason to be-
lieve that growth will prove a suc-
cess here, and the sheriff's discov-
ery will lead to further experiment.

Before the railroad was built to
Moro, a stage line between that
place and The Dalles could never
be made to pay, says The Dalles
Times-Mountaineer. But now, since
Moro has railroad connections, a
four-horse stage is being run from
here three times a week, and is
loaded with passengers and freight
every trip. Has the railroad devel-
oped the country so as to thus
increase staging business or have
the people just awakened to the
pleasures of stage riding?

A newspaper war is in progress
at Roseburg. The editor of one
paper pictures the editor of its es-

COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES.

Miss Daisy Badger began a five
months term of school in district
No. 8, on Dec. 26.

That Gillians Quarterly mention-
ed in the course of study can now
be had in Salem from Geo. W. Jones
publisher of the Ore. Teachers'
Monthly. There are several num-
bers on various topics. The one
on Geography costs 40 cents.

The state board of education no-
tifies us that there will be but two
examinations for state papers each
year. One in February and one in
April and two for county papers
one in April and one in August.
All applicants should govern them-
selves accordingly.

Jessie Rose finished a very suc-
cessful term of school on Pleasant
Creek Jan. 12. During the term
unusual interest was shown by the
patrons, there being over 40 visits
and two public rallies, one on
Thanksgiving and one at Christmas.
A good start has been made toward
a library. Teachers of this sort are
being called for by progressive dis-
tricts.

Another statement has come from
Supt. Ackerman warning all parties
interested that no incorrect reports
will be accepted at the state de-
partment. This means as before
suggested that clerks must be care-
ful in their reports to the county
superintendent. In the annual re-
port item 29 of this years report
must be the same as item 48 of
last year; that is the amount on
hand at last years report must be
the same as the amount on hand at
the beginning of this years report.
The sum of items 47 and 48 must
equal item 35. That is the total
amount of school funds received
during the year plus the amount
on hand at beginning of the year
must equal the amount expended
plus the amount in the hands of
the district clerk at the close of the
school year. Cut this out for refer-
ence.

Examinations for those expecting
to complete the eighth grade work
this year will be held May 24 and
25. Part of the branches may be
passed in each month according to
the wishes of the teachers and pu-
pils. The questions will be made
out by the state department, sent
to county superintendents and then
sent to those schools where there
are pupils who are ready for them.
This is uniform throughout the
state and diplomas will be signed
by county superintendents as well
as teachers and school boards for
those who pass such examinations.
The papers will be mailed to the
superintendent who will see that
they are graded. This will make
much more work for state and
county superintendents but they
are willing to undertake it for the
sake of advancing the standard of
our schools. There will also be an
examination in November and a
pupil may finish and graduate at
any one of these dates. It will be
arranged so that a pupil can take
the examination whether there is
school in the district or not and
those who care to at home and com-
plete the course in Jackson county
will be given the examination and
a chance of securing the diploma.
