The adverse decision of the Court of Claims yesterday gave Dewey \$9,550,70 instead of \$19,001,40 of Manila prize money. We like Dewey as well as ever—but business is business always.

Representative Cannon, who heretofore, during the present session, has prevented the consideration of the Nicaragua canal bill, says that within the next few days he will allow it to be taken up and debated until passed.

London's last census, nine years ago, showed a population of 4,211,000. New York confidently expects this year's census to show her to have above 3,600,000. She may pass London before the middle of the coming century.

In Jewell County, Kansas, a man married a girl named Booze, the other day. This leads the local paper to say: "The young man did a charitable act. And the law can't touch him for handling it, either, if this is a prohibition State."

This summer the main streets of our city should be graded and given a coat of gravel or granite. The expense will be very light and can be born by the abutting property easily. We hope to see our city officials take some action in this matter ere long.

The report of the Commissioner of Patents show that, in the year 1899, the total receipts of the office amounted to \$1,325,457, a sum but twice exceeded in the history of the office. The patent office is one of the departments which pays as it

goes, and has turned into the Treasury \$5,000,000 more than it has drawn out.

Candidates for office will find the NEWS to be a good medium for reaching the eye of the people. The cards of those who desire to announce themselves will be published from the present date up to the time for holding the conventions for \$2.50 each.

Senator Hoar does not approve the Administration's policy in the Philippines; but he thinks it would be preposterous to elect Mr. Bryan to the Presidency, and he reluctantly concedes that the present Congress will determine our attitude toward our insular possessions.

Why patronize non-advertisers? If they do not think enough of you to advertise their goods or keep their place of business before your eyes in your local paper, you cannot expect to receive good bargains from them. In order to do business, the men who cater to the trade will be the successful ones.

One of the most remarkable examples of municipal ownership in the United States is shown by the town reports of Edinburg, Ind. Incandescent electric lights are furnished to the residences for 15c a month and business houses for 20c a month for 16 candle power lights. Waterworks are also operated at an annual charge of \$1 to each consumer and a complete and perfect telephone exchange is maintained with a monthly rental of 50c. There are municipal enterprises, all self-supporting, and the city has achieved almost a national reputation in consequence.—Ex.

Commissioner Evans points out that since July 1, 1861, there have been allowed 1,606,189 claims for pensions the enormous sum of \$2,389,910,975. This is practically a payment equivalent to \$1000 for every soldier in active service on the Union side, and is considerably more than that for every soldier who remained in the service for as long as three years. It is estimated by the commissioner there are now about 1,000,000 survivors of the Union army, and of this number nearly three-fourths, or 745,000, are actually pensioned. It is shown that we have paid in pensions a sum equal to five-sixths of the national debt at the close of the war, and are now paying every year in pensions a sum equal to 5 per cent on the national debt at its highest figure.—New York Times.

In view of the presence of smallpox in so many towns in this state we clipped this notice from an Illinois exchange; The following was communicated to the Liverpool Mercury by a Mr. Hine. He says: "I am willing to risk my reputation as a public man if the worst case of smallpox cannot be cured in three days simply by the use of cream of tartar.
