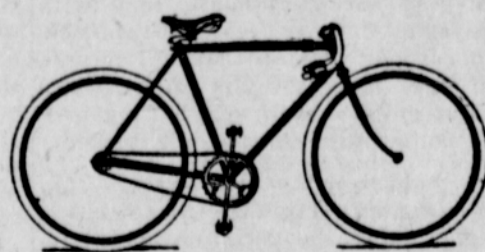

A. Carter for services as recorder and hall rent \$12. J. L. Hammersley \$5. A. J. Olsen \$27.25, Mrs. Fannie C. Birdsey \$31.25, were reported by the finance committee and warrants ordered drawn. A. C. Cunningham asked permission for two weeks further time in which to remove his barn from the alley the same being granted. The recorder was instructed to post notices of the city election to be held on Monday, April 2, 1900, from 1 to 4 o'clock, and to procure the necessary election supplies from the News Printing Company. Martin McDonough, E. Ray and Dan Richards were appointed judges of the election and Carl Phelps and A. J. T. Smith clerks. Notices for a caucus for nominating a ticket were ordered posted by the recorder for March 15th. A. C. Stanley was appointed as a committee of one to prepare a financial statement of the resources of the city in connection with the City Recorder. J. W. Marksbury's bill for \$25 for placing the sale of the water bonds was presented and laid over for further consideration. There being no further business to come before the board the meeting adjourned.
