Papers throughout Oregon are still urging voters to register. More than half of them are not yet on the books.

Gold Hill will have a boom this spring and summer. There are ten or fifteen new buildings to be erected here this season besides a custom quartz mill, which was begun the first of the week.

Colonel Bryan says "the Republican party is not what it was in the days of Lincoln." Is the Democratic party what it was in the days of Jefferson or of Jackson? Parallel the statements of Jefferson and of Jackson with those of Bryan, on money and expansion, and see.

It doesn't take much time to register. A few minutes now may save voters much worry about election time; therefore be wise, and register and have the trouble over with. As it stands the law is simply an absurd unconstitutional fake, but the easiest way out of the trouble is to go at once to the officer who has charge of registering in your precinct and comply with the formality of the fake—fight it afterwards, but take no chances of losing your vote this year—Observer, Moro.

Fake, or no fake it is the duty of every voter to register and the sooner the better for the voter.

We have been asked and have heard others asked, in fact it is a common inquiry, whether the proposed amendment to the constitution on "initiative and referendum," is to be voted on at the general election in June. It has been proposed only once by the Legislative Assembly and must come before the Assembly again and obtain a favorable action, before it can come before the voters of the state. This concession will doubtless be made by the legislature next winter to those who have so long insisted on the submission to the people of Oregon the question whether this method of legislation shall be introduced into our system. If it passes next session, it will be voted on at the next general election or two years hence.—Oregonian.

Prominent men of all parties are beginning to agree that the election of senators should be by the direct vote of the people. Everyone has become so thoroughly disgusted with dead-locks, wranglings, and accusations of bribery, that it seems evident that every voter in the land will cast his ballot to the end that the Constitution of the United States be amended in respect to the election of senators. There are some who may be loath to change the law established by our forefathers; yet it must be borne in mind that difficulties and complications, unforeseen by the founders of the Republic, have arisen, which makes it necessary that a change be made. If the election of senators were put in the hands of the people, direct it would be placed beyond the reach of unscrupulous men, and other matters of importance would then receive due attention, which now are disregarded, or sacrificed, for this subject of all-absorbing interest.

SEVENTY YEARS OLD.

A man seventy years old has lived eight hundred and forty months, 3,640 weeks, 25,567 1/2 days, 613,603 hours, 36,816,480 minutes. He has been awake 17,044 days, and has slept 8,522 days. He has walked 172,836 miles or more than five times the distance around the earth. If he has spoken an average of five words per minute during his waking hours, it would require 1,000 volumes of four hundred pages, each five by seven inches, set in long primer type to record his utterances and utterances if printed on a sheet four inches wide, in the same type, would reach a distance of forty-four miles, 1,013 feet and four inches. He has eaten about thirty-nine tons of solid food or about 26,009 pounds of meat, a like amount of vegetables, and the same quantity of bread stuffs. His drinking supplies have amounted to about three hundred and seventy-five barrels. If he has smoked three five cent cigars each day since he was twenty years of age, the cost to him has been \$2,737.50.
