States, and insistence on the prin-
ciple—if there is any principle in
the matter—of a miserable little 15
per cent tariff will assuredly rise
up to plague its authors later on.

Last Wednesday morning a barn
belonging to Joseph Poley in Ash-
land was burned to the ground, in-
volving a loss of about \$450. Two
horses and a cow in the barn were
rescued with considerable difficulty.
The barn was filled with hay, and
contained besides a new wagon,
harness and other materials. No
lights had been used around the
structure the night before and the
fire is supposed to have been of
incendiary origin.

The Southern Pacific railroad is

being the first car load which is to
be placed in the new passenger and
freight depot. The present small
depot is to be used and an addition
added making the whole building
about 125 feet long and similar in

the agent, express and telegraph, a
baggage room and a freight room.
Work will commence soon and be
rushed through to completion.
