A special to the Tribune from Washington says: "Frank Jones, of New Hampshire, undisputed leader of the Granite State Democracy for a quarter of a century, and a bosom friend of ex-President Cleveland during the latter's 12 years of political activity, has renounced all connection with the Democratic party, and will vote and work for McKinley this year. For 16 years, up to 1896, Mr. Jones was the chairman of the delegation from New Hampshire to the Democratic National Convention. He was a delegate to the convention which nominated Bryan, but when he found that free silver was a certainty in the platform, he broke away from the party before the convention and voted for McKinley. He has been elected a delegate to the Philadelphia convention by the New Hampshire Republicans.

Col. E. F. Fleming, who was appointed under ex-President Cleveland as clockmaster of the treasury department, still holds that position. He has over 500 clocks in his care, and is known as "Father Time." He starts on his round of winding his eight-day clocks on Monday and gets around to the last one on Saturday night.

The organization of a Business Men's Association, or a Board of Trade in Gold Hill is a first step in the march of progress. Our business men, in entering into such an organization, have agreed to lay aside petty differences and unite in an endeavor to bring outside capital to Gold Hill.
