The populists and democrats re-

It is astonishing how many have
"yielded to the pressure of friends,"
and are out for office. So many
feel called upon to serve their coun-
try; it is really astonishing.

There are many "good" papers in

For an enterprise that brings
best returns to the farmer the
creamery is the thing. The Al-
bany creamery, representing a cap-
ital of \$5000, was built in 1895.
Taking figures for 1899, it received
the milk of 383 cows from 52 pat-
rons, handled 1,675,580 pounds of
milk, and made a product from the
sale of which it realized \$18,237.18,

of which \$14,450.19 net was re-
turned to the 52 patrons in pay-
ment of the butter fat taken from
the milk. The difference of \$3767
represents cost of manufacture,
transportation charges, interest on
stock and amount laid aside each
year to be applied towards taking
up shares of stock outstanding.

P. H. Daily of Gold Hill, for-
merly of the State Normal school
at Drain, and well known in this
county, was nominated in the re-
publican county convention last
Saturday, at Medford, for the office
of county superintendent of public
schools in that county. This is a
good selection, and the county is to
be congratulated, as well as Pat.—
Plaindealer, Roseburg.

We heard rumors in town today
of a rich strike made by Richard
Swackers, on Foots creek, nine
miles from Gold Hill, of quartz
which goes hundreds of dollars to
the ton. By the time our next
issue comes out we hope to be able
to give details verifying the re-
ports which have come to town.
Mr. Swacker is a brother of Mrs.
Carl Phelps and Mrs. McKnight of
this city.

THOS. H. TONGUE RENOMINATED.

The nomination of Thomas H.
Tongue by the members of the First
Congressional convention at Mc-
Minnville was not a surprise, al-
though Jackson county would have
been greatly pleased to have had
Hon. E. V. Carter, her favorite, ob-
tain the coveted plum.

Hon. Thomas H. Tongue is now
serving his second term in the
United States house of representa-
tives. At his last election the vote
stood in the First Congressional
district:

Thos. H. Tongue, republican.....21,324
R. M. Veatch, fusionist.....19,287
J. L. Hill, regular people's.....1,833
L. H. Pederson, prohibitionist.....1,113
giving Mr. Tongue a plurality of
2,037 votes. Mr. Tongue's home is
in Hillsboro, Washington county.
He was born in Lincolnshire, En-
gland, June 23, 1844, and emigrated
with his parents to Washington
county in 1859, where he has since
continuously resided. He was edu-
cated at Forest Grove, admitted to
the Oregon bar in September, 1870,
and has ever since practiced his
profession as a lawyer, and has
also been extensively engaged in
stock-raising. Mr. Tongue has al-
ways been a republican, and was
elected as a state senator in 1888,
serving four years. He was a dele-
gate to the national republican
convention of 1892, and in 1894
was the permanent chairman of
the Oregon state republican con-
vention, a member of the state cen-
tral committee from 1866 to 1896,
and the chairman of the congress-
ional committee of the First dis-
trict from the time of its organiza-
tion until his first election to the
United States house of representa-
tives, when he defeated W. S. Van-
denburg of Coos county, then popu-
list nominee, by the narrow mar-
gin of 67 plurality. Mr. Tongue
enjoys the reputation of being an
able speaker, and has been active
for Oregon's interests during his
service in congress. His re-election
is a foregone conclusion.

C. B. Watson, who was nomi-
nated for district attorney of this
judicial district by the republicans
this morning, carried Jackson coun-
ty in 1893 by 90 plurality, the vote
being:
