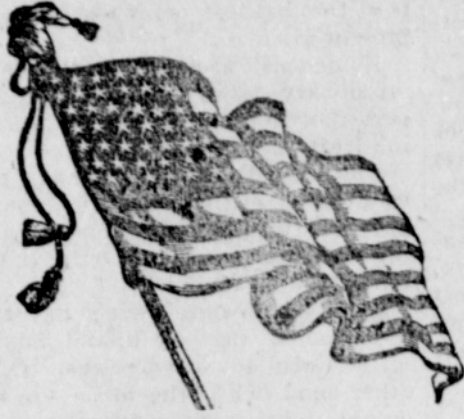

A man who has worked several
years for a firm can accomplish
more good than a new hand. The
same is true of our Congressmen.
The renomination of Moody and
Tongue, is a tribute of the faith of
the people in these Representatives,
as well as recognition of the fact
that the policy of electing a Repre-
sentative for one term only is not
a wise one for a district or state.

A peculiarity of the Oregon reg-
istry law is that no opportunity is
afforded for registration for the
November election after the books
have been closed for the June elec-
tion. Every one, therefore, who
wishes to vote for President this
Fall must register before May 15.
The only provision under which
voters not registered can vote in
November is the section authoriz-
ing "swearing in" of votes, which
is uncertain and at best trouble-
some.

Last Tuesday Louisiana held its
first election for Governor, under
the new Constitution. The suffrage
clause of the new Constitution re-
quires that in order to vote, a man
must be able to read and write, or
pay taxes on \$200 worth of prop-
erty, or be a descendant of a man
who voted before the war for the
Union. These restrictions will dis-
franchise a large majority of the
colored voters, while leaving the
white vote practically intact.

Thomas H. Tongue, the republic-
an nominee for congress in this
district, has proven the truth of the
experience of all who are elected to
serve the people in the important
capacity of a congressman, that it
takes more than one single term
there to get the confidence of the
members of that important body,
and the state that retains the ser-
vices of their representatives, so
long as they are in harmony with
the party sending them there, is
the state to get the most favors
from congress in the way of appro-
priations. Oregon needs the ex-
perience of such a man as Mr.
Tongue, and the people appreciate
the facts of the case, and will un-
doubtedly return him to his seat in
the United States House of Repre-
sentative at the election in June.

the most favorable light, and as the
readers are to have the first consid-
eration in the eyes of the publisher,
the reputation of the town abroad
is carefully guarded by the paper.
But when it comes to the business

port, it is an indication of a pro-
gressive spirit which is a very
healthy sign.

The money circulation of the
country, which was \$1,509,729,200
on July 1 1896, has increased to
\$2,002,931,791 on March 1, 1900.
Nearly \$300,000,000 of this increase
