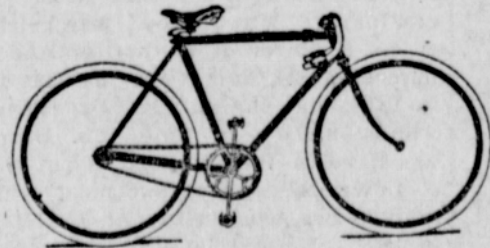

DIED

MILLER.—At his home on Galls creek, Sunday evening, April 15, 1900, B. F. Miller, aged 67 years, 10 months. The funeral was held at the family residence Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, and a large cortege of friends and relatives followed the remains to the Sams Valley cemetery where he was laid to rest.

MOON.—In Gold Hill, Tuesday morning, April 19, 1900, Andrew Sylvester Moon, aged 70 years. The funeral was conducted Friday afternoon at the M.E. church by Rev. Gregory, of Central Point. Interment in the Sams Valley cemetery.

Wednesday morning Mr. Moon was unloading lumber from a car near the ice house and hauling it to the McNeil house. He had the wagon nearly loaded, when a train came along and frightened the team. Mr. Moon in attempting to get hold of the lines, which were lying on the ground, stumbled and fell under the wagon and was so injured by the wagon passing over his body that he was rendered unconscious, and the next morning breathed his last, never having spoken after the accident. Andrew S. Moon was born in Susquehanna county, Pennsylvania, May 20, 1830. He came to Oregon in 1859 and settled in Jackson county. He married Miss Melissa Cox, at Jacksonville, April 11, 1865. Eleven children survive the union: Mrs. G. M. Davis, of Kalamathon, Cal., Chas. Moon, of Glendale, Ralph Moon, of Kent, Truman Moon, in Sherman county, Newman Moon, of Klamathon, Cal., Mrs. S. C. Tweedy, Geo. Moon and Mrs. J. D. Snipes, of LaGrande, Andrew Moon at Mares Island, a navel cadet, and two children at home, John and James. Mr. Moon has a farm of four hundred acres in Sams Valley, but was living in Gold Hill.
