IN OUR MINES AND MILLS.

What Our Miners are Doing.—Pick-up on the Street.

F. H. Kelly is putting up a new stamp mill on his property on Sardine creek, a short distance from Gold Hill. The boiler and engine arrived this week, and is now being put in place. He formerly run an arastra on the property, but it showed up so well that he decided to put up a mill. This property, like hundreds of others, was abandoned, because it would not pay to hand mortar it, and lay open for a long time, until Mr. Kelly, with good judgment, determined that it would pay to open and develop it, and as a consequence he has a good mine.

"Development work" does not always develop, if it be shallow shaft sinking, running a lot of short tunnels, and in general, "gophering." It often costs more to sink several shallow holes and run little drifts than one good shaft would, sunk deep enough to develop an ore body. While, of course many a good prospect has been ruined by developing it, if development be desired, the most usual better way is to concentrate the expenditure in one good shaft or tunnel rather than scatter. A rifle does better execution than a shotgun.—Ex.

Tom Stanley, on Water Gulch about two miles above Gold Hill, has a force of men running a tunnel to tap his ledge at a depth of forty feet. Last month some miscreant went to his upper tunnel and at a point of about 12 feet from the end of his timbers, put a shot in the roof and blew it out, the debris filling his cut completely. It was done purely through spite, and if the culprit were known it would go hard with him.

Marion and George Lance are making a clean-up at their placer claim, on Foothills creek, a short distance from Gold Hill. This is one of the best claims in that section and is operated by two giants all winter. They expect a much larger clean-up this spring than has ever been made before and they have done exceptionally well on it in the past.

Robinson & Hunter, who purchased the Eclipse mine of J. B. Griffin of Woodville, a short time ago, are running a tunnel which will tap the ledge lower down than before. The ledge prospects splendidly and they expect to take out a rich lot of ore.

Lane's Pan Amalgimator and Concentrator at Houck's mill is doing excellent work on soft rich ore. The belt concentrator is a close saving contrivance of concentrates, both of magnetic iron and sulphurets in base ore.

E. G. Borden is working on a proposition to build a 12-mile ditch from Evans creek around to Saxe creek, which will prove of incalculable benefit to the mining and irrigating interests of this section of the county.

Some good ore is being taken from Sam Duffields mine on Miller gulch. Mr. Jones in the same gulch is working his mine and the dump is steadily becoming larger with high grade ore.

Work on the Bliss mine goes steadily forward. A force of men are at work putting in an inclined

shaft. W. F. White the superintendent is expected from Portland shortly.

B. Fallows, owner of the Wild Cat on Galls creek is developing his claim rapidly. This claim was recently purchased from Foster & Wolf.

S. P. CARPENTERS IN TOWN.

Work on the New Depot Which will be 24x86 Begun Wednesday.

Last Wednesday morning eight carpenters arrived on the morning train and began work on the new depot immediately. The new building will be 24x86 feet, with a waiting room 20x24, a baggage room 14x24, an office 14x24 and a freight house 38x24. It will be built something similar to the new depot at Medford and will not only be a great improvement to our town but will be useful to the traveling public. The old depot having long since proved too small to accommodate the business handled by the company in our town.

A SAD CASE.

It appears that Hattie Howard, the wayward Medford girl, who has already put the county to an expense of nearly \$80 to send her to the Florence Crittenden Home, near Portland, has gotten away from that institution, and together with the alphabetical Captain Smith, also of Medford, has been located at Arlington, Gilliam county. Smith was the old fellow who followed the girl to Dunsmuir, some two months ago, and created a great scandal there, and endeavored to marry her when he was exposed. She was arrested, brought back to this county and sent to the reformatory home at Portland. It is reported that Smith followed to Portland, helped the wayward Hattie escape from the home where she had been sent by the County Court of this county, took her to Eastern Oregon and there tried to desert her leaving her penniless. It is also reported that both the girl and Captain Smith are under arrest at Arlington and awaiting orders from the authorities of this county.—Tidings.

The jury in the case of A. J. Hamlin, charged with assault with a deadly weapon on Ed Armstrong, which brought in a verdict of guilty, with a recommendation that the accused be fined, exceeded its prerogatives under the Oregon law, and Judge Hanna was left no option except to fix the penalty at imprisonment in the penitentiary, the term fixed being 18 months. An appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court on the ground that a majority of the jury was in favor of acquittal, and only agreed to recommend a fine as a compromise.
