DEMOCRATS DIDN'T FUSE.

The Populists Are Not Satisfied—Will Nominate a Ticket.

The democratic convention which met at Jacksonville last Saturday placed the following ticket in the field:

Representative—J. H. Beeman, Gold Hill; J. L. Bachelor, Ashland. County Judge—Charles Prim. Sheriff—W. H. Brunk. Clerk—L. L. Jacobs. Recorder—W. O. Marks. Assessor—Martin McDonough. Treasurer—J. H. Gay. School Superintendent—L. A. Stocking.

Commissioner—George P. Lindley. Surveyor—L. S. Trefren. Coroner—Dr. J. E. Shearer.

The convention appointed a committee of three to confer with a like committee from the fusion Populist convention at Medford, with a view of uniting upon a ticket for joint support. The convention took a recess for 30 minutes to enable the two committees to confer. The conferees returned a verbal report, conceding the County Judgeship to the Democrats, and asking that a good ticket be nominated, and that the fusion Populists be given representation on it. One man only—George P. Lindley, for Commissioner—is known to be a Populist. It remains to be seen whether the Populists will support the ticket with this cold crumb of comfort.

The sentiment of the convention was about evenly divided as to the policy of the union, and, when the question was sprung, so much opposition was developed that its advocates were afraid to press it. The ticket is not regarded as a strong one.

Rydal Bradbury and Miss Mae Milsap are teaching in Prospect and Mt. Pitt districts respectively, having entered upon the terms work April 30th.

Carl VonderHellen was taken sick last week so that school was suspended. Pupils and patrons are hoping for a speedy recovery.

Catherine Buckley, teacher in Purcell district, has engaged the school in No. 34, on Thompson Creek, where she will begin on May 7th.

One of the most economical, though not the cheapest, cuts of beef is that part of the round used for a pot roast. It is possible to obtain a comparatively small roast of that cut with no bone to add the price. Its value as a pot roast is greatly increased if it is larded with narrow strips of pork. In cooking the following is a good method to follow: Put into the kettle a few slices of pork and one large onion cut in slices, also a bit of bay leaf, two or three cloves and one poppercorn. Let these cook for about ten minutes, then add the beef with its larding of pork and let it sear over on all sides. Let the beef cook without water for 20 minutes, then pour in about one quart of boiling water, and let it simmer until tender. Before it is done add salt and a dash of pepper. This makes essentially beef a la mode, although carrots are generally added.
