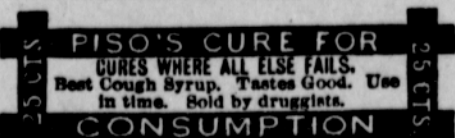

INGENIOUS NEW SHOES.

One Has Pneumatic Soles and the Other Opens at the Back.

A French inventor has just patented a shoe with pneumatic soles. The air chamber is contained between an upper and lower sole, and is so arranged that a new supply of air can be pumped into it from a valve opening at the heel. It is claimed that a man wearing a pair of these shoes will be saved the constant jar resulting from walking over hard pavements, and that consequently his health will be greatly improved and his life prolonged. They are particularly recommended for use by city dwellers and by those whose business requires them to be constantly on their feet.



A Chicago man has just secured a patent on a shoe which opens at the back instead of the front, as is customary. The part which serves as a tongue in the new arrangement is so large that when it is unfastened it gives free access to the shoe, so that the foot can be slipped in over the counter. Instead of laces or buttons the shoe is fastened with ball fasteners, one row on either side fastening on to the tongue or "quarter," thus securing the shoe to the foot and doing away with overlapping edges.

A Legless Wheelbarrow.

Metal barrows are coming in slowly, but none the less surely, this being another of the many instances in which steel and structural iron are supplanting the time-honored wood. They are designed for work in mines, and being indestructible and cheap they are especially adapted for the use of contractors.

The body is hung very low, and is of such a shape and strength that little damage can be done to it, even though it be severely handled. The frame bars and handles are formed of one continuous piece of pipe. The wheel is also especially designed, the hub consisting of two interlocking clutches, between which the spokes, consisting of pieces of bar iron bent so as to form two spokes, are held. Not the least valuable feature of this barrow, the invention of William James Freed, of Eureka, Utah, is the fact that if damaged it can be repaired by ordinary mechanics, all the parts being simply put together and designed with that end in view.

The absence of legs, it will be noticed, is interesting, and allows the barrow to rest flat on the ground, so that it may be quickly and easily filled and dumped. The legs, it is asserted, are one of the weakest parts of the ordinary wheelbarrow, and are apt to become loose and rickety.

Hunger the Best Sauce.

There are many good old stories that are worth reviving. Here is one about Henry VIII., who took to the crown all the property of the church, and who, during his reign, had many jokes at the expense of the abbots and the clergy. On one occasion he had been hunting in Epping forest, and had come to Waltham Abbey alone, disguised as one of his own guard. Dinner was just ready, and he was invited to the abbot's table. His appetite was so good that the abbot at last exclaimed, unaware whom he was addressing, "I would willingly give a hundred pounds on condition I could feed as heartily on beef as thou dost." A few days later the abbot was mysteriously sent for, taken to London, and committed to the Tower, where for some time he was fed on bread and water, wondering the while what crime he had committed. One day, however, a sirloin of beef was set before him, and his hearty attack thereon showed that the strict regimen of his captivity had worked wonders. The money was in due course paid, and the prisoner went home to Waltham rejoicing.
