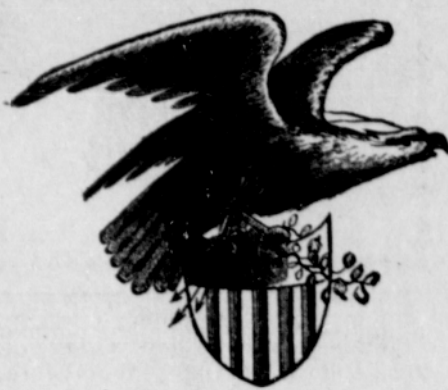

Remember there can be no registration after May 15, neither for the state election in June nor for the Presidential election in November. After May 15, there will be the long, tedious and expensive process of getting the testimony of six witnesses as to your qualifications, and the witnesses must be freeholders. The simple and easy way for the qualified voter is to register at once. There are yet many voters in Jackson County not registered. Avoid the rush during the last days by registering now. And if you are not registered it will be no easy task to furnish the proof, after May 15, that you are a legal voter. Remember also that it will cost you trouble to vote in the Presidential election, if you do not register now.

Remember that district attorneys and county school superintendents elected this year will serve four years, in accordance with enactments of the last legislature.

Do not forget that before you can cast a vote at the coming state and and presidential elections your name must be on the register. The time is now on to have your name put there. If not registered before May 15 you cannot vote. You can register before any notary public or justice of the peace free of cost, or at the courthouse in the county clerk's office. Do not neglect to register.

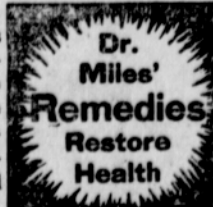
