The people of Jackson County will sustain the demurrer of C. B. Watson on the election of one Reames as prosecuting attorney of this district.

There are \$4,000,000 of uncollected taxes due in New Orleans—which would seem to suggest that a city must be pretty prosperous which can be as easy on its debtors as that.

When the Supreme Court decides that the recent Porto Rican legislation is constitutional, Mr. Bryan will have another reason for demanding the suppression of that body.

The announcement that John R. McLean, brother-in-law of Admiral Dewey, has dropped his support of the veteran sea-fighter's President-

ial aspirations means one of two things—either the admiral is going to retire from the field or there has been the liveliest kind of a family row.

Hon. T. H. Tongue, the republican nominee for congress should have an easy race, as his opponent is a banker—a real populist and a banker. Just think of it. A populist banker for congress. It is also said he has not taken pains to commit himself either on the money question.—Ex.

W. A. Carter, our candidate for representative is a self made man. He has held the office of city recorder for four terms and has made an excellent record for himself. He was admitted to the bar of Oregon last fall and is now a member of the law firm of Hammersley & Carter of this city.

Mr. Robertson says the law forbids any man to make a contract payable in silver to the exclusion of gold. The law does nothing of the kind. Contracts can be made for delivery of any commodity, whether gold, silver, sheet iron or brickbats. No law is needed to make men accept good money.

Two years ago G. A. Gregory secured the nomination for School Superintendent by a majority of one vote over P. H. Daily in the Republican convention. This year Daily secured the nomination by a majority of eleven but still Gregory has such an itchy palm that he is "Independent." Snow him under.

The national congressional committee has done Congressmen Thomas H. Tongue, of Oregon, the honor of selecting one of his speeches on the financial question as a campaign document. Congressmen Tongue is in pretty good company at the national capital, and ranks among the big brainy men of the country, and the voters of our state will see to it that he is kept there for the coming term.

This should be a straight Republican year, in respect to the support of any man who may have a voice in determining or directing national policies. The issues are too important to trust to luck or accident—or to the Demo-populistic party. Free silver is dead beyond the remotest danger of resurrection. But we have the large questions of national and business expansion,

the construction of the Nicaragua canal, and other important issues. Do not think of voting for a candidate for the Legislature or for Congress who is not a Republican, and in full sympathy with his party on these great questions.—Statesman.

In as much that G. A. Gregory has seen fit to question the authority of P. H. The Assessor's Office.

The most important county office is that of assessor. The revenue to conduct the affairs of the county are derived directly from the levy based upon the listing of taxable property in this office. The voters of this county will show their appreciation of what he did for them by returning him to his seat in the house of representatives at the election on June 4th.

Gus Newbury, the present county clerk is asking the citizens of Jackson county to give him their support for another term, which they will do with a rousing majority on June 4th, because he has done his work so faithfully the past two years and shown himself to be the right man in the right place.
