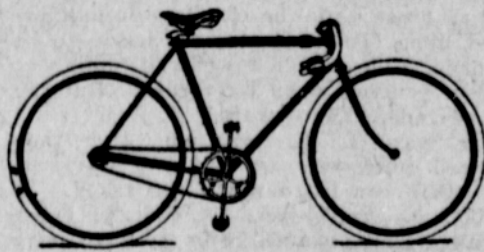

LAKEVIEW IN ASHES.

Lakeview, May 24.—The entire business portion of this city, was destroyed by fire, which started in the Lakeview House, on Water street, Tuesday evening, at 8 o'clock. The U. S. land office, the bank and the three hotels are included in the burned district. The brick building owned by Dr. Daily, and occupied as a drug store by T. V. Hall was saved. Most of the buildings were constructed of pine and burned like tinder. The loss is difficult to figure, but will reach \$350,000.

Lakeview is the county seat of Lake County, and is located at the mouth of a large canyon and against the hills overlooking the Great Goose Lake, with a population of about 1000 which was burned to the ground Wednesday has been steadily increasing of late. It has churches and a \$14,000 school; a bank with \$254,000 paid-up capital, six large merchandise establishments, 3 good hotels, restaurants, two weekly newspapers, the Examiner and the Register, a United States land office, telegraph and telephone lines, well-graded and graveled streets; natural hot spring water and mud baths, and pure mountain water. The town has been rapidly improving in the building line. A fine racecourse adjoins the town. Steps were recently taken to provide the town with a new system of water works for fire purposes, sewerage and power. The town is lighted by electricity. Lakeview is the largest town in that section, and is the market for the vast cattle business of the district. A railroad is being built into the town. The Nevada, California & Oregon Railway Company has commenced extensive work from their terminus, at Amedee, Cal., and are rapidly building toward Lakeview with a force of several hundred men. The Corvallis & Eastern Railroad is contemplating tapping that district. Transportation of freight is now made to and from Amedee by big teams, and passengers are carried by stages to Amedee and Ager, the latter place a convenient point midway between Portland and San Francisco. The entire country is a network of stage lines carrying mail and passengers. The value of the property of Lake County, of which Lakeview supplies the greater part, as shown by the last tax-roll, is \$1,444,168.

Mrs. Coffee has a very sore arm and hand from her fall and Mr. Moore is limping around with a sore leg.
