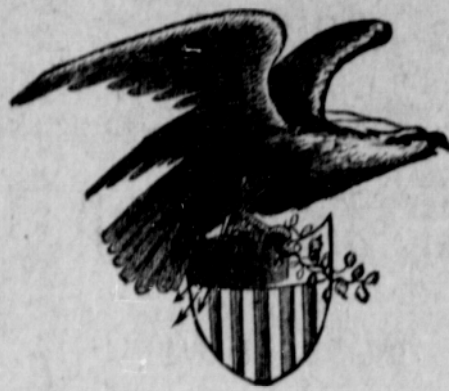

Constitutional Amendments.

At the election next Monday the
electors are requested to vote on
five different proposed amendments
to the state constitution. The first
on the ticket is "Municipal Indebt-
edness Amendment" which is in
substance as follows:

"No county, city, town, school
district or other municipal corpo-
ration shall be allowed to become
indebten in any matter or for any
purpose to any amount including
present existing indebtedness, in
the aggregate exceeding five per
centum in the value of the taxable
property therein, to be ascertained
by the last assessment for state or
county taxes previous to the incur-
ring of such indebtedness."

The next one is the "Judiciary
Amendment" which is as follows:

"The legislative assembly may
provide for the election of supreme
and circuit judges in distinct classes
one of which classes shall consist
of five justices of the supreme
court, who shall not perform circuit
duty; and the other class shall con-
sist of as many circuit judges as
may be deemed necessary, who
shall hold full terms without allot-
ment, and shall take the same oath

as the supreme judges. The legis-
lative assembly may create as
many circuits as are necessary."

The "Irrigation Amendment"
reads as follows:

Resolved by the house, the senate,
concurring: That the following
amendment to the constitution of
the state of Oregon be and hereby
is proposed: That the constitution
be amended by adding Article 19,
as follows:

ARTICLE XIX

Section 1. The necessary use of
lands for the construction of reser-
voirs of storage basins for the pur-
pose of irrigation or for rights of
way for the construction of canals,
ditcher, flumes or pipes to convey
water to the place of use for any
useful, beneficial or necessary pur-
poses, or for drainage of mines or
the workings thereof, by means of
roads, railroads, tramways, cuts,
tunnels, shafts, hoisting works,
dump or other necessary means to
their complete development or any
other use necessary to the complete
development of the natural re-
sources of the state or preservation
of the health of the inhabitants, is
hereby declared to be a public use
and subject to the regulation and
control of the state.

Section 2. The right to appro-
priate the unappropriated waters of
any natural stream to beneficial
uses shall never be denied.

Section 3. The use of all waters
now appropriated for sale, rental or
distribution, also of all waters origi-
nally appropriated for private use
but which, after such appropriation,
has heretofore been or may here-
after be sold, rented or distributed,
is hereby declared to be a public
use and subject to the regulation
and control of the state in a manner
prescribed by law. But the right
to use and appropriate such waters
shall be subject to such provisions
of law for the taking of private
property for public or private use
as is provided in Section 18, Article
1, of the Constitution of the State
of Oregon.

Section 4. The right to collect
taxes or compensation for the use
of water supplied to any county,
city, town or water district or in-
habitants thereof is a franchise and
cannot be exercised except by au-
thority of and in a manner pre-
scribed by law.

The "Repealing Amendment"
reads as follows: "That section 35
of article 1 of the constitution be
and hereby is repealed. The sec-
tion referred to reads as follows:

"No free negro or mulatto, not
residing in this state at the time of
the adoption of this constitution,
shall come, reside, or be within this
state, or hold any real estate, or
make any contracts or maintain
any suit therein; and the legisla-
tive assembly shall provide by
penal laws for the removal by pub-
lic officers of all such negroes and
mulattoes, and for their effectual
exclusion from the state, and for
the punishment of persons who
shall bring them into the state, or
employ or harbor them."

The "Equal Suffrage Amend-
ment" allowing women to vote
reads as follows:

"Be it resolved by the senate, the
house concurring: That the follow-
ing amendment to the constitution
of the state of Oregon be and is
hereby proposed: ARTICLE 1. The
elective franchise in this state shall
not hereafter be prohibited to any
citizen on account of sex."

shall pursue the same course that
I have heretofore; my whole time
and all the ability I possess will be
devoted to your service. My abili-
ty as a surveyor and knowledge of
what is a proper description of land,
has been of good use to many peo-
ple of the County during the past
two years. My knowledge of mines
and mining law and my unbounded
faith in Jackson County as a min-
ing region has been of service to
the miners and to the mines of the
County.

I would say in conclusion that I
would have been glad to have met
you all and exchanged greetings
with you had not unavoidable cir-
cumstances prevented me; that no
matter what your decision may be
on the 4th of June I shall still feel
toward you as becomes brothers
and fellow pilgrims through this
vale of tears.

It would make me feel very proud
of myself and of my record if you
should say by your votes on June
4th. "Well done good and faithful
servant do it again." My number
on official ballot is 48.
