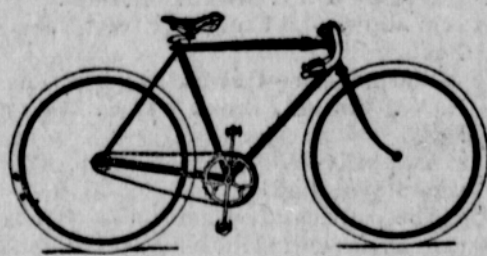

Politics was very quiet in the city Monday and nothing happened to mar the peaceable town until late in the afternoon when a dispute over some hogs came very near ending in a fist combat.

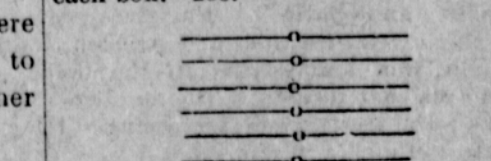
The fittings for the extension of the mains of the city water works in the south end of town arrived last Wednesday morning and work was commenced Thursday morning to complete laying the pipes.
