The Chautauqua management are glad to know that your people are interested in this year's assembly and that so many are planning to attend. To those who have not yet become acquainted with Chautauqua, a list of this season's speakers and a brief outline of our schools will no doubt determine for them this summer's outing.

Chautauqua has combined pleasure with instruction. Each year brings more people to camp in our beautiful Chautauqua Park. The Park is a natural grove through which flows Ashland Creek. During Assembly time the grove is electric lighted. Tents will be rented, so long as the supply lasts, at \$1.50 for the Assembly. Camping privileges, with city water, are free to all holding membership or season tickets.

Perhaps our most attractive feature this year is the music. The management have completed arrangements with Prof. Wilberforce J. Whiteman of Denver, Colorado, to direct the music. Besides the usual chorus class, this season initiates the children's chorus class. Prof. Whiteman is particularly suited to the chorus work, and is at present director of the Denver Philharmonic Society; also choir leader in the great stone church at Denver.

Mr. Whiteman is accompanied by Mrs. Whiteman, who is an accomplished concert contralto soloist. Her singing in New York almost created a furore. Just before coming to us Mr. and Mrs. Whiteman appear on the programme of the National Music Teacher's Association at Des Moines, Iowa. Mrs. Whiteman will give us two recitals and assist in the concerts. The following is from the Musical Courier of New York City:

Chaplain Gilbert, who was with the Second Regiment, Oregon Volunteers throughout the campaign in the Philippines, and who was a personal friend of every soldier in his regiment will give us two interesting lectures.

Our Round Table this year will be directed by Prof. W. M. Clayton of the Southern Oregon State Normal. Each day has been carefully planned, and Mr. Clayton is confident of placing before our people the most instructive Round Table that we have had.

We replace the cookery class this year with a course in Domestic Science, where instruction is given in all branches of home-keeping. The course is directed by Miss Grace E. Morey of Oakland, Calif., and will include lectures on interior decoration, marketing, arrangements of table, laundry work, etc. The ladies who have been with Miss Morey during previous years will not let this opportunity pass. Miss Morey will also conduct a cookery class for girls.

The elocutionary and physical departments are under the direction of Miss Lottie J. Graeber of San Francisco, Calif., who comes with the highest recommendations as a teacher of elocution and physical culture.
