Train Brakeman Killed.

J. C. Pardee, aged 36 years, a brakeman on the S. P. train, who resides in Ashland was killed by the cars of the north-bound freight train, on which he was working Saturday night about 12 o'clock, in the yard at Dunsmuir. Pardee was headend man on the train, and on leaving Dunsmuir handed the engineer the telegraphic orders with instructions to meet a south-bound train at Mott. Nothing was seen of the brakeman, and when the train arrived at Mott he was missed and telegraphed for to Dunsmuir. The crew on a south-bound freight found his remains on the track in the Dunsmuir yard, both legs and his arm having been run over and his skull badly crushed. Deceased came to Ashland from Leavenworth, Wash., eight months ago. He leaves a wife and one daughter.
