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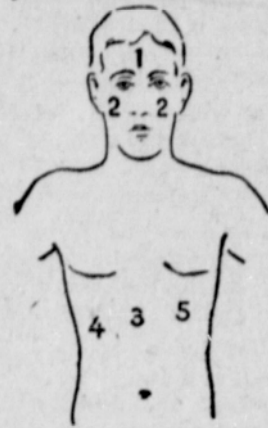

tax for school purposes.

Lakeview now has three brick
manufactories in operation.

The La Grande creamery is re-
ceiving the cream product of 400
cows.

A co-operative creamery will be
established at Milton, in Umatilla
County.

The necessary acreage is pledged
to secure a starch factory at Imbler,
in Union county.

The Newberg creamery has been
sold to the patrons, and will be run
on the co-operative plan.

Huntington warehouses are com-
pletely filled with wool and the
season's clip is by no means all in
yet.

The Marshfield town board is
taking steps to put in an electric-
light plant to be owned by the
public.

Lake County woolgrowers will
probably pool together this year,
and hold their product for Eastern
buyers.

The first sale of wool at Hunt-
ington this season was made last
week to a Chicago firm, at 14 cents
per pound.

The County Judge of Washington
County has been authorized to em-
ploy an expert to examine the
records and files.

New buildings, involving an out-
lay of \$109,500, have gone up in
Grant's Pass this year, according
to an estimate made by the Observ-
er.

A case of smallpox has made its
appearance on Coos River. A
strict quarantine prevails, and there
is little danger of the disease
spreading.

The annual convention of the
Christian church, of Oregon, begun
its sessions at the Turner camp-
grounds Thursday. There were 18
camps the first forenoon, and 15
ministers were in attendance.

Hood River people are somewhat
worked up over the discovery of a
quartz ledge on the north side of
Mount Hood that promises to be a
valuable property. The ore is gray
oxide of copper, and is said to carry
\$4 in gold and \$68 in silver. Min-
ing men pronounce it an excellent
prospect.

Prominent G. A. R. men are agi-
tating a move for a joint encamp-
ment next year of the Washington
and Oregon Grand-Army men. The
subject has been discussed several
times and railroad rates were at
one time secured, but nothing fur-
ther came of it.

Astoria officials have received
notification from the Treasury De-
partment at Washington, to the
effect that a contract has been made
with St. Mary's Hospital, at Astoria,
which is to furnish quarters, sub-
sistence, nursing and medicine at
\$1 per day to seamen entitled to re-
lief from the Treasury Department.
