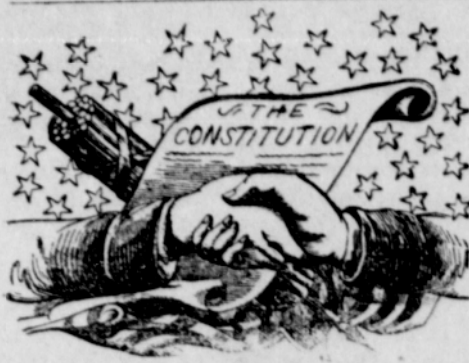

The rainy season is about due in the Philippines, and Aguinaldo may surrender rather than suffer a three months' drenching.

All the Filipinos want, if they surrender, is everything in sight, and employment at nothing to do and good salaries.

The Dakotans, who a few months ago were freezing, are now scorching. And yet some people in Oregon grumble about a little June moisture.

It is to be presumed that Mr. Bryan will not object to the full protection of American interests in China. Bryan is willing to afford the Nation every facility for upholding its honor and safeguarding its citizens except an army.

Even the Chinese have been buying many guns and great stores of ammunition during recent years—especially since that peace conference. Evidently the Chinese authorities were not in the least deceived by the hypocritical pretenses of the so called civilized and Christian nations.

There are British, Russian, Japanese, Italian, Austrian, German and American Admirals at Taku, and so far not one of them has been able to send his Government any positive news in regard to the situation a few miles inland. It is a good time for them to stick to their ships.

Little has developed in the Chinese situation during the past week beyond the fact that the immensity of the proposition is being more generally realized. Tien Tsin has been relieved and a force has been started to relieve Admiral Seymour's command, which is surrounded 10 miles from Tien Tsin.

In only three instances have Presidents of the United States been succeeded at the expiration of their terms, by their Vice-Presidents. John Adams followed Washington, Jefferson succeeded Adams and Van Buren fell heir to the office when Jackson retired. Is the old custom to be revived in 1904, after disuse for more than two-thirds of a century?

The President has ordered American troops from Manila to China for the defense of American citizens without the authority of Congress, despite the fact that the Constitution gives Congress alone the power "to declare war." But war may exist without and declaration, and it is the duty of the President of the United States to protect its citizens all over the world in such a situation.

WATER ORDINANCE.

An ordinance to regulate the distribution, sales, prices, and to protect misusage of water, water plant, and property.

THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF GOLD HILL DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SEC. 1—All waters used from the city water plant shall be sold, except for fire purposes, at the following rate per month:

For private families for house and domestic use, 3/4 inch pipe or less	\$1 00
For use of stores, offices, barber shops, churches, blacksmith shops (one forge), bath tub (one) or baker shop, 3/4 inch pipe or less	1 00
For use of saloons, hotels, restaurants and wash houses or laundries, 3/4 inch pipe or less	2 00
For use of livery, sale and feed stables, where buggies, hacks or vehicles are washed, for 3/4 inch pipe or less	2 00
For use of livery, sale and feed stables, where buggies and vehicles are not washed, for 3/4 inch pipe or less	1 00
For use in stables where no more than two horses or two cows are kept, (for stable use only)	75
For water wheels or motors, for each 1/2 horse power or less	1 50
For sprinkling streets in front of each store, office or other places of business, 3/4 inch pipe or less	1 00

Provided that any person buying water from the city and using the same for the benefit of their business shall not be required to pay for sprinkling the streets in front of their place of business. All water rent shall be due and payable in advance. All distribution of water and prices not provided for in this ordinance shall be regulated hereafter by the town board.

It shall be unlawful for any person to sprinkle without a nozzle on the hose to cause a spray instead of a straight flow of water making the streets muddy and wasting water.

For building purposes such rates as the water agent may agree on with the contractor or builder. (The word agent shall apply to the person having the water in charge)

SEC. 2—Every person desiring water for any purpose or use, must apply to the agent in writing, stating the use and purpose the water is to be had for, and shall not use it for any other purpose, without first making a new application, and paying additional charges, if additional water is used.

Any person desiring to discontinue the use of water for any time or period must notify the agent of his intentions in person or writing, giving the day or time said service is to be discontinued and at that time must pay all money due the agent, when the agent shall take out the stand-pipe and plug the service. If water thereafter be desired, a written notice and the payment of 75 cents must be made to the agent who will place the stand-pipe and turn on the water.

The water may be shut off at any time from the mains for repairs without notice.

No changes in any service shall be allowed without a written permission from the agent.

SEC. 3—Irrigating clover, gardens or grounds of any kind, where much water is required—1/4 acre for 3/4 inch pipe, per month \$3.00. More or less to be based on the same schedule.

SEC. 4—The town shall own and control all hydrants, pipes and taps outside of buildings or lots. Any person running pipes inside of buildings or on their lots shall place same at their own expense.

SEC. 5—The town shall not be compelled to lay any pipe at any distance where the sale of water will not justify the expense. But any person desiring pipes laid to such places may do so by paying for all necessary pipe and fixtures, and paying for water as provided by this ordinance.

SEC. 6—All water rent shall be due on the first Monday of each month, and any person refusing to

pay at that time, the water agent shall stop from using water and commence action at law before the Town Recorder for the amount due, if any be due.

SEC. 7—Any person ordering pipe and faucets put in and immediately afterwards refuse to take water shall be compelled to pay for putting in said service at the regular price.

SEC. 8—It shall be unlawful for any person to waste water, or allow it to run over lots not intended to irrigate or on the streets or alleys or on adjoining lots without paying for same; or to allow water to form in cesspools or become stagnant. Any violation of this section shall be declared a nuisance and be subject to the ordinance on nuisances.

SEC. 9—All persons using water must furnish their own hose, if a hose should be desired.

SEC. 10.—In case there should be a fire in the city any person using water and allowing it to run or flow any where must immediately stop the running or flow of water. In such a case they shall not be deprived of their rights to the water to replace the water afterwards by the agent that the person should have used.

SEC. 11.—Any person using from another persons hydrant, shall pay the same rates as if the hydrant were put in for them, except otherwise provided for in this ordinance.

SEC. 12.—People coming to town to market or traveling through shall have the privilege of watering their driving horse or team at any of our hydrants. It shall be unlawful for any person to tie or hitch a team or a horse to any hydrant and shall be fined five dollars for each offence.

SEC. 13.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to play with any hydrant. It shall be the duty of the city marshal to stop all such, if necessary arrest all such offenders and fetch them before the Recorder who shall fine them a reasonable fine.

SEC. 14.—When there are two or more using from the same hydrant ten cents per month shall be deducted from the regular price where the water is carried up stairs for any person the same regulation as provided in sections one, five and six shall apply to this.

SEC. 15.—Any person who shall wilfully injure in any way by cutting, breaking or clog up the hydrants or fire hydrants or pipes mains or injure the reservoir in any way or throw in it any trash, mud or dead birds or animals of any

kind or bath or swim or damage any water hose or hose wagon, upon conviction shall be fined no less than twenty dollars nor no more than fifty dollars with costs of suit. In default of paying fine, shall work the same out on the streets at one dollar and fifty cents a day. Should the person live outside of the corporated limits and escape before or after arrested or escape at any time before judgment be satisfied, such offenders shall be charged with the offence by the marshal in the name of the town of Gold Hill before any justice of the peace, and the laws of the State of Oregon shall govern the Justice of the Peace having the case in charge.

SEC. 16.—No person shall be allowed to drill or tap any pipe without the consent of the water agent having the same in charge. Any person guilty of such a violation shall be fined no less than ten dollars and costs.

SEC. 17.—This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.
